## B. C. CABINET IS ANNOUNCED TODAY

### Gordon Sloan Attorney-General And John Hart Named Minister Of Finance In Administration

PREMIER PATTULLO TAKES PORTFOLIO OF RAILWAYS—WELLS GRAY, LANDS; DR. MAC DONALD, AGRICULTURE; MACPHERSON, PUBLIC WORKS; PEARSON, MINES AND LABOR.

VICTORIA, Nov. 15: (CP)—Premier S. F. Tolmie resigned as Premier of British Columbia today and Hon. T. D. Pattullo was immediately called upon to form a new government. Distributing representation to all parts of the province, Mr. Pattullo submitted the following cabinet list to the Lieutenant Governor whose approval will come as a matter of form:

Premier, President of the Council and Minister of Railways, Mr. Pattullo.

Provincial Secretary and Minister of Education, Hon. Dr. G. M. Weir, Vancouver-Point Grey.

Attorney General, Hon. Gordon Sloan, Vancouver Centre.

Minister of Lands, Hon. A. Wells Gray, New Westminster.

Minister of Finance, Hon. John Hart, Victoria.

Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Dr. K. C. MacDonald, North Okanagan.

Minister of Public Works, Hon. F. M. MacPherson, Cranbrook.

Minister of Mines and Labor, Hon. G. S. Pearson, Alberni-Nanaimo.

Mr. Sloan and Mr. Hart have yet to be elected to the Legislature, the former being candidate for Vancouver Centre and the latter for Victoria at the deferred election to be held November 27.

## Prime Minister Makes Appeal For Support of Province in Heavy Job

### Advises Electors of Vancouver and Victoria to Join Their Voice in Mandate—Strong Government Needed By Country at This Time

VICTORIA, Nov. 15: (CP)—Following his swearing in today as Premier of British Columbia, Hon. Thomas Dufferin Pattullo, Member of the Legislative Assembly for Prince Rupert, made the following statement: "I told a friend of mine the other day that the only thing more distressing than running a government was forming one because of the personal equation. There is a wealth of material in the new Legislature. Given the capacity, I have deemed it desirable that all portions of the province should be represented. The cabinet embraces both requirements.

The new government is immediately faced with six deferred elections. Through no fault of their own, men nominated on the Liberal ticket now face the situation of an already assured majority. There is a lot of loose talk about the government already having a large enough majority and that what we need now is a strong opposition. I would like to point out that we had a strong opposition and a weak government previously. What we need now is a strong government and we won't need to worry about the opposition.

"At scores of meetings I told the people that it was very necessary that the province and Dominion should co-operate and collaborate together in order to adequately meet many pressing problems confronting us. I expect to go east before the next Legislature meets and I want behind me the unequivocal voice of British Columbia.

"I appreciate the confidence the public has placed in me and I pledge all that is in me to meet their hopes and expectations. I now ask the people of the Capital City and Vancouver Centre to complete the job by giving me solid support so that Eastern Canada may know that British Columbia speaks with one voice."

## CLOSING OF WORLD FAIR

### Century of Progress Exposition Concludes in Chicago But Will Re-open Next Year

CHICAGO, Nov. 15:—After having been in progress for five months, the Century of Progress Exposition has come to a close. A new record attendance of over 22,000,000 for a World's Fair was set up and the event is believed to have been a success financially.

The major part of the Exposition will be held intact with a view to re-opening it next summer.

## MOLLISONS AMBITIOUS

### Will Give Up Long-Distance Flying But Not Until After Record Made, Says Amy

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Nov. 15: (CP)—"We shall probably give up long distance flying but we are not going to give up until we set a world's record for a long-distance non-stop flight," Mrs. Amy Johnson Mollison stated here.

## Martial Law In Force in Hungary

### Precautions Taken Against Expected Uprisings on Anniversary of Founding of Republic

BUDAPEST, Hungary, November 15.—As a measure of precaution against expected uprisings on the anniversary of the founding of the Republic of Hungary, martial law was declared throughout the country. In spite of this there was much disorder during the day and riots and demonstrations were general. Five hundred arrests were made. General strikes are now feared.

## POUND STERLING AT \$5.35 ON TUESDAY

NEW YORK, Nov. 15:—The British pound sterling closed at \$5.35 on the local foreign exchange yesterday, having continued its spectacular gain since passing parity last week. The Canadian dollar, closed at 1 1/2c premium, also being up.

## NEW GOLD FIND MADE

### Superintendent of Prince Rupert Group of Claims in City—Go- ing South For Conference

A. J. Ingraham, superintendent in charge of the Prince Rupert group of claims on the Queen Charlotte Islands for the Hydah Gold Mines Limited, is paying a brief visit to the city, having arrived last night on the Prince John from the Islands.

Another new strike has just been made on the Prince Rupert group which the Hydah Gold Mines Ltd. has had under active development for some months now, it being of such importance that Mr. Ingraham is going tomorrow from here to Vancouver to consult with the company in regard to changes which will, as a result, have to be made in the development program this winter. The discovery is a two-foot vein with splashes of gold showing through the quartz.

Mr. Ingraham states that the program planned for summer has been completed and he will, in view of the new discovery, discuss the situation with the directors. In the meantime a new winter camp is being built at Kootenay Harbor to enable work to proceed just as soon as they have decided on what to do.

The superintendent says he is well pleased with the progress made so far. They have driven one tunnel drifting on the vein for 274 feet and another 75 feet on another vein, in addition to considerable surface stripping and other work.

Mr. Ingraham is very careful of his statements in regard to the property which he says is still only a prospect although he is very hopeful of making a mine of it.

MONTREAL, Nov. 15: (CP)—George T. Bell, aged 72, former executive assistant to the traffic vice-president of the Canadian National Railways, died on Monday after a long illness.

## PROBING OF KIDNAPPING

### Abductors of Brooke Hart of San Francisco Not Heard From Since Ransom Demand

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 15:—Despite widespread search, there were no further developments up to last night in the case of Brooke Hart, 22-year old son of Alexander J. Hart, wealthy San Jose store owner, who was kidnapped last Thursday. No further contact has been made between the abductors and Hart's parents following the original demand for \$40,000 ransom. Police are continuing their investigation into the youth's disappearance.

The abductors, in a telephone call following the kidnapping, threatened that the youth would be slain if his parents sought police assistance.

## Water Very High In Neighborhood Of Kitsumkalum

Reports reaching the city from the Government Telegraphs office at Roswood tell of exceptionally high water conditions in the Kitsumkalum Lake country near Terrace. Turbulent streams, far above their usual levels for this time of year, have swept numerous bridges out and everything moveable along the banks of the streams is afloat.

## Dirigible Macon And Battle Fleet Do Their Stuff

SUNNYVALE, Cal., Nov. 15:—In collaboration with battleships of the Pacific fleet of the United States Navy, the dirigible Macon will engage in defensive manoeuvres off the California coast this week.

## FOGS CAUSE STRANDINGS

### Union Steamer Ashore in Howe Sound—Japanese Vessel at Chamainus

VANCOUVER, Nov. 15: (CP)—The Union Steamship Co.'s passenger vessel Capilano grounded in the fog near McNab Creek on Howe Sound late Tuesday. Passengers were taken off and the ship will likely be refloated this afternoon undamaged.

The Japanese freighter Koryu Maru refloated from Bird Reef at Chemainus Tuesday afternoon after having stranded earlier in the day in the fog. It was undamaged.

## Increase in Fuel Oil Tax is Asked

### New Liberal Government of British Columbia Being Asked to Sponsor Legislation

VICTORIA, Nov. 15:—Coal mining interests of the province of British Columbia will ask the new Liberal government to sponsor legislation providing for an increase of from 1/2c to 1c per gallon in the fuel oil tax, it is reported here.

## Gold Unchanged

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 15: (CP)—The United States Treasury Department paid \$33.56 for gold today as compared with \$34.06 in London owing to the rise in value of the pound.

## WARM IN CALIFORNIA

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 15:—Warm desert breezes brought a November heat wave to Southern California during the last few days. Los Angeles had thermometer readings of over 90 on other points reported correspondingly high temperatures.

## "CADDIE" WAS SEEN IN QUEEN CHARLOTTE ID. WATERS 27 YEARS AGO

Old timers of the Queen Charlotte Islands state that "Caddie," the sea serpent which is reported to have been seen several times recently in the vicinity of Victoria, is no stranger in British Columbia waters. As far back as 27 years ago, a marine monster about 100 feet long with a similar camel-like hump in its back is reported to have appeared in Queen Charlotte Island waters and almost every spring since it has been seen. Last year it was around Lawn Hill for over a week and was seen by hundreds of people.

## COAL MINE STRIKE OFF

### One Hundred Thousand Pennsylvania Miners Favor of Return- ing to Work

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 15:—The strike of 100,000 Pennsylvania anthracite coal miners has come to an end, the men having voted in favor of returning to work.

## New York Mayor To Retire Upon \$15,000 Pension

NEW YORK, Nov. 15:—Mayor John P. O'Brien, who was defeated by Fiorello LaGuardia in his contest for re-election last week, will retire on a city pension of \$15,000 per annum, it is announced.

## Canada Trade Much Better

OTTAWA, Nov. 15: (CP)—October revenue of the Dominion government from customs and excise was \$2,500,000 greater than in October last year. The total volume of trade was \$101,000,000, \$7,500,000 greater than the same month a year ago. The export balance stood at \$19,000,000.

## Chicago Epidemic Is Investigated

### Fifteen Deaths Attributed to Amoebic Dysentery, Rare Tropical Malady

CHICAGO, Nov. 15:—Chicago health authorities are conducting an investigation into an epidemic of amoebic dysentery, rare tropical disease, which is reported to have caused fifteen deaths among visitors to the recent Century of Progress Exposition. Texas Guinan, New York night club operator, who died a few days ago in Vancouver, is believed to have been a victim of the malady which is said to have spread through the medium of certain local hotels.
