WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Repairs Being Made to Elevator Wharf—Salmon Cannery and Salteries Still in Operation—Halibut Fishing Petering Out

John Cunningham, representing the Northern Construction Co., has arrived in the city from Vancouver to take charge of work which is about to be undertaken of renewing fender piles and boom logs at the wharf of the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator which is being put in shape by the federal government for the Pool. The work, it is expected, will occupy about a month's time and will mean employment for several men. George R. Eltherington, supervising mechanic for Canadian government elevators, has been spending several days at the local house this week on official business.

There were no casualties among the deer of Refuge Bay. Porcher Island, despite the ten day's activities of Bill Watts, George Johnstone and Alex Finnie, prominent in the local grocery trade, who returned to town on Wednesday night with Bill Miller aboard the Porcher Island mail boat. The outing, nevertheless, was a very enjoyable one for all concerned. Weather, generally speaking, was quite good which means that it must have been a good deal different than it was in our fair city over the same period of time. For the trio this Porcher Island hunting expedition has now become an annual institution which none of them would miss for anything—even if they do get skunked as they did on this occasion.

The handsome power yacht Sea Dog, demonstration boat for marine products, paid another visit to port late this week following a cruise to various southeastern Alaska points showing her wares to the folk of that part of the country. The Sea Dog, which hails from San Francisco and had her owner, H. A. Snee on board, arrived here at 6 o'clock Thursday evening from Ketchikan and sailed this morning in continuation of her return voyage southward.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelais, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 4:15 yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Jens Larsen, who has been awarded the contract for carrying the mail between Anyox and Alice Arm, has been in Prince Rupert recently on business in connection with a new launch which he purchased here with which to carry out the work. The boat will run twice a week. Mr. Larsen was accompanied by his wife and they returned to Alice Arm on the new boat.

The snagboat Essington, which has been at the dry dock for the past two or three weeks undergoing certain repairs, was towed yesterday morning by the Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Winnemac to Digby Island where she has now been tied up for the winter.

Hunting Votes and Birds
Having on board W. O. Fulton and B. J. Bacon, who will engage in electioneering on behalf of T. D. Pattullo, the next Premier of British Columbia (at least that is what Bill and Jim are saying), the gas-boat Elida, Capt. Eddie Hudson, sailed this morning for Georgetown, Port Simpson and Warke Canal. Return to port will be made Sunday night or Monday morning. Some bird as well as vote hunting is planned.

The B. C. Packers salmon cannery at Namu in the central area is still continuing to pack fish and will likely carry on until the chum run on the Queen Charlotte Islands shows signs of diminution. So far, the run is still going on in full swing with good catches being made by the seiners in operation there. Namu is also taking fish from the Rivers Inlet seining grounds. Two salteries at Jedway and Houston Inlet are also running on Queen Charlotte Island chums.

With fishing in Areas No. 3 and 4 due to come to a legal close for the season on October 26, operation of the halibut fleet on the Pacific Coast is now gradually petering out with boats tying up as they reach port and landings all over the coast farther few and far between, resulting, at least, in an improvement of price conditions. During the week ending yesterday nine vessels including one lone Canadian, landed catches totalling 308,000 pounds at Prince Rupert, bringing the grand total catch for the season up
