ROYAL CHILDREN BEGGED BUTTONS

Young Princes Wanted Souvenirs from the Canadian Officers and Got Them.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
London, July 6.—Today the Prince of Wales, Princess Mary, and Prince George visited the overseas soldiers' camp at Chelsea and inspected the different contingents. The Prince of Wales specially asked where the different companies of Canadians came from and begged a button from Colonel H. H. Maclean's tunic, a request promptly complied with. All the commandants gave him their badges, whereupon Prince George demanded similar gifts. The South African soldiers gave their peculiar lion's roar, and the Canadians gave the Royal children three cheers, with a tiger, and sang "O Canada."

LLOYD GEORGE'S GREAT SPEECH

Nearly a Hundred Thousand Applications to Hear the Great Little Chancellor.

Birmingham, July 6.—Mr. Lloyd George's great speech on the National Insurance Bill at the Birmingham Town Hall last Saturday was remarkable for the enormous number of applications for seats that poured in. It outvalued as a measure of public interest Mr. John Bright's famous address at Bingley Hall.

The demand for tickets was such that the Liberal Association offices had to be closed on Thursday. Up to noon that day the number of tickets applied for, despite the fact that the meeting had not been advertised, reached the total of 70,000. This was at the Liberal Association headquarters alone. At the federation offices several thousand other applications had been received.

As the town hall, when packed to its utmost limits, will not accommodate 3,000 people, the difficulties of those who had the duty of allotting the tickets will be realised.

It was the first public speech made by the Chancellor outside the walls of Parliament since the General Election, and marked the complete recovery of his voice.

Mr. Arthur Brampton presided in the absence of Sir Arthur Nicholson, the president of the Midland Liberal Federation.

HAVE BOUGHT FIFTY REINDEER

Government Buys Them from Dr. Grenfell for Far Northwest.

Ottawa, July 6.—The Government of Canada has made addition to the transportation facilities of the country in the form of fifty reindeer. The purchase was made from Dr. Grenfell, of Labrador, who is being paid fifty-one dollars each for the animals. They will be taken from Labrador by boat to Quebec in September, and will go by train to Edmonton or to Athabaska Landing, if the Canadian Northern has rails down to that point, early in the autumn. Scows will be built to complete the journey down the Athabaska River to Fort Smith which is the destination of the herd.

The reindeer have proved a great success in Labrador. The conditions have been found entirely suitable for them, and the original herd of three hundred have grown by natural increase to some twelve hundred. They have proved to be as good for travel as in Lapland, and their flesh and milk have proved a boon on more than one occasion.

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CANADA'S POPULATION IS NEARLY TWICE AUSTRALIA'S

Census for Australia Shows Increase of Only 675,694 in Ten Years While Canada Has Increased by About Two Millions

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Melbourne, Australia, July 7.—

The new census gives the Commonwealth of Australia a population of 4,449,495.

According to the Statesman's Year Book, the population of the Commonwealth of Australia, consisting of New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, West Australia, and Tasmania, in the census of 1901 was 3,773,801.

The increase in ten years, therefore, would be 765,694.

Canada is growing much faster than Australia. At the last census she had a population of 5,317,315, and the census this year is expected to show about eight million people.

The increase during the previous decade was slow, totalling only 438,076. The last decade will probably show an increase of well on to two millions.

TWO YOUNG GERMAN BOYS STARTED OUT AS PIRATES

Their Heads Turned by Reading Trashy Stories They Seized a Fishing Smack, Killed the Captain, Threw Man Overboard, and Wounded Five Men Before Being Captured

Berlin, Germany, July 5.—As a consequence of reading stories of the exploits of pirates, two young German boys from Bremen have turned pirates on the Elbe with deadly consequences.

They are a ship's apprentice named Ernest Voigt, a lad of seventeen, and George Tiem, a chemist's assistant, of the same age. First of all they seized a fishing smack, run up the black flag, killed the captain, and held at bay a fleet of pursuers, wounding five seamen.

They boarded the fishing smack as she lay at anchor, and found one hand on duty. Him they overpowered and threw into the river. The seaman, who was a good swimmer, succeeded in reaching the shore.

After hoisting the black flag at the vessel's mainmast, the boys set out for sea, Voigt acting as navigator. Captain Schnoemer, the skipper of the smack, missed her when he came down to the quay desiring to go aboard, and, on learning that she had gone down the river, he hired a motor-

boat and went after her.

More than one rifle must have been in the armoury of the young pirates, and they used them at short range with paralysing precision. Schnoemer, the captain, was killed, and the owner of the motor-boat, who was driving it, abandoned the chase, and landed the body afterwards notifying the police.

Then four fishing yaws took up the chase, but the pirates kept them at bay with their rifles, and succeeded in wounding five persons.

In the end a Government despatch steamer chased and overhauled the smack, and a detachment was sent on board.
