GEOLOGICAL SURVEYS IN THE DISTRICT

In his notable speech on reciprocity in the House of Commons, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in his usually brilliant style poked some sardonic fun at Hon. George E. Foster. The member for North Toronto forgetting all his professorial economics, and his own arguments for reciprocity when he was a member of Sir John Macdonald's Government, had urged upon the House the wisdom of "preserving our natural resources for our children and our children's children."

It was a palpably fallacious plea, since it is only by developing our natural resources that we make them of any value either to ourselves, our children or our children's children. Sir Wilfrid's satiric refutation of Mr. Foster's argument is worth preserving as an illustration of how to explode false economic theories with simple material easy to hand.

"The Indians were men after the heart of my hon. friend from North Toronto, they were noted for being great preservers of natural resources. They kept them not for themselves, but for their children and the children of their children. They never used them to any great extent. The territory they inhabited contained many minerals; but when our ancestors came here, they found the Indians using implements made of bone and stone. They never cultivated the soil; they lived on fish and game. They were in the midst of immense forests, but they never felled a tree to build a house. They lived beside the most noble streams in the world, but they did not use them to turn a wheel; they were people after the heart of my hon. friend from North Toronto."

Strongly contrasted to the Conservative idea of conserving wealth, is the work done during the year by the Department of Mines in its efforts to exploit the mineral wealth of Canada by giving reliable advance information to prospectors and investors as to the whereabouts and character of the mineral locations. In his own constituency and our own constituency of Comox-Atlin, the Minister of Mines has had several geological survey parties at work. There was Mr. D. D. Cairnes' party at work investigating the ore deposits in Atlin. This district for a decade has been known as a placer field. During the past season some very promising developments have taken place there in lode mining.

In the Stewart district Mr. R. G. McConnell's party was at work studying the geology and ore deposits at the head of the Portland Canal. This district had attracted phenomenal attention, owing to the "mountain of gold" stories that had been circulated. While promising deposits had been found, the department by sending out reliable despatches, averted a wild boom, and prevented injury being done to the district and the investing public.

Up in the Hazelton and upper Skeena district Mr. W. W. Leach has done valuable work during the season in the topographical and geological mapping of the district. The approach of the Grand Trunk Pacific has brought this district into great prominence, and promising discoveries of silver-lead, copper and coal have been made.

Independent and properly authenticated reports on the various properties and discoveries made, are contained in the reports of the departments of geologists, which form the strongest kind of testimony in support of bona-fide properties.

Expert opinion on the formation of the rocks over large areas is given—aiding the prospector in his choice of suitable territory in his search for mineral, while sometimes, as in the case of Mr. Cammell's discovery of diamonds in the peridotite of Olivine Mountain, the government geologists have become the pioneer prospectors in new mineral districts.

In devoting sums of money for investigation work in the mineral areas of Canada, the Government is doing a good work. Mining development follows on the heels of the economic geologist. Prince Rupert's hope for a government experimental smelter depends upon the use that is made of the opportunities to develop the mineral areas in the vicinity.

The cost of authorship of a Government blue book such as the recently issued report of the Geological Survey, is greater than that of the "six best sellers" put together. But it is work which has a great influence on the development of the country and the wealth and happiness of its inhabitants.

KITSUMKALUM HAS NOW

A FARMERS INSTITUTE

Certificate of Incorporation Received, and New Society Starts Out With Enthusiasm—Strong Body of Officers Elected—F.K. Wishart Secy.

(Special Correspondence)

Kitsumkalum, July 4.—The long talked of "Farmers' Institute" was inaugurated in the church hall at this place Friday evening, June 30, 1911. Fair weather and a large turnout of the settlers put the new institute on a good footing to start with.

Objects of Society

The meeting was called to order by the Rev. Thomas Marsh as chairman. Mr. Wishart, secretary pro tem, read the certificate of incorporation, which is issued from the Department of Agriculture. The charter defines the territory

embraced by the Kitsumkalum Farmers' Institute, the boundaries of which take all territory tributary to the Skeena River and lying between Lorne Creek and Lakelse River including the Kitsumkalum and Lakelse valleys. He explained a few of the many advantages derived and concluded by congratulating the settlers in having an institution of such a beneficial nature in their midst.

Officers Elected

Election of officers for the ensuing year was then proceeded with. The act governing institutes calls for election of officers by

ballot which passed off very smoothly. The candidates were very wisely chosen and will without a doubt give a satisfactory account of their stewardship. They comprise the following well known gentlemen: Rev. Thomas Marsh, president; S. C. Weeks, vice president; F. K. Wishart, secretary treasurer; H. L. Frank, H. M. McPherson, George Dover and Lee Bethurem, directors; H. M. McPherson, George Dover, auditors. F. K. Wishart, Delegate to Central Meeting.

Keenly Contested

The president, vice president, secretary and auditors were elected by acclamation. The Board of Directors was keenly contested and resulted in the selection of four hustling ranchers who are determined to make the Kitsumkalum Farmers Institute a credit and honor to the district over which it takes jurisdiction. They also are taking steps to have the institute housed in a building of its own at the earliest possible moment.

The Institute starts off with a membership of about fifty, and from the way applications are coming in it won't be long before the hundred mark is reached. The saving alone on powder to members clearing land is sufficient inducement to make every settler in the district a member. There are many other advantages quite as important without taking into account the social end. It is hoped to get nearly every rancher in the district into the Institute.

FOREST RESERVE IN THE ROCKIES

Dominion Government Takes Steps to Ensure Timber and Water Supply for Settlers.

The boundary of the Rocky Mountain Forest Reserve has now been located from the international boundary northward to a point due west of Lacombe. This was accomplished last summer (1910) by two parties sent out by the Dominion Forest Service. One of these, under Mr. G. H. Edgecombe, B.Sc., B.Sc.F., started at Calgary and worked southwards, while the other, under Mr. P. Z. Caverhill, B.Sc., worked northward from the same starting point. The full report of these gentlemen has just been published.

During the coming summer (1911) it is expected that the rest of the eastern boundary of the reserve will be located to its northern limit (about forty or fifty miles north of the latitude of Edmonton).

Object of the Reserve

The primary aim in preserving the forests of this area is to provide a supply of timber easily accessible to the dwellers on the prairie. But there are other things, scarcely, if at all, less important, to be attended to. To users of water for irrigation and for the generation of power it is important to have an even flow throughout the year, and the effect of forests along streams, and especially at their headquarters, in thus regulating stream-flow is well known. Moreover, in order to keep up the level of the water in the soil throughout the prairie regions the level of the rivers must be maintained, and the flow not allowed to decrease to a mere dribble in the summertime. In the maintaining of this volume of water in the rivers the forests have an important effect.

The Land Within the Reserve

In deciding as to what land to include in the reserve the chief question asked has been, "Is it suitable for farming?" If it is, the rule has been to leave it out; if not so suitable, to include it on the reserve. The altitude, or height above sea-level, has also been an important consideration.

Throughout all the territory reported on game was plentiful. Special mention is made of the bull, cut-throat and grey trout, among the fish, and, among the birds and animals, in their respective districts, duck, grouse and prairie chicken, deer, moose, elk and sheep and many kinds of fur bearing animals. Among the mineral resources of the areas are the coal beds, oil-fields (in the south) and quarries of building stone.
