

Various Proposals For Betterment of Conditions in Province Included Under Fourteen Point Program—Aid From Ottawa in Municipal Financing

VICTORIA, June 7: (Canadian Press)—Premier S. F. Tolmie last night announced the platform of the new Unionist party under fourteen headings bearing largely on the creation of work, extension of markets and return to the land of many men now idle. The platform advocates national state health and contributory unemployment insurance, creation of a marketing board, survey into industrial openings for labor and an aggressive campaign to advertise the resources of the province. The manifesto also advocates revision of interest rates, a revised curriculum in the schools, orderly marketing of farm products, better control of municipal borrowings, improved labor laws, adherence to work rather than the dole for relief and continued operation of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

The Premier declared that the party should urge upon the federal government the appointment of a royal commission to inquire into the subject of better terms, recognizing that the financial stability of the municipalities is an integral part of the financial stability of the province.

"The party will as far as possible protect the public against the inflation of capital of companies by means of watered stock," adds the manifesto.

#### Two Million Cut In Civic Budget Of Seattle City

SEATTLE, June 7—Advance warning was given yesterday by Mayor John F. Dore of that further cuts in civic services and possibly salaries would be necessary during the coming year when, in his annual message to the city council, he intimated that a cut of \$2,000,000 in the civic budget for the ensuing year would be essential.

#### BONUS CUTS MODIFIED

Executive Order Issued Yesterday By President Roosevelt Welcomed by Veterans

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 7:—It was welcome news for war veterans throughout the United States yesterday when announcement was made that an executive order had been issued by President Franklin D. Roosevelt modifying the originally announced reductions in ex-service men's compensations. Under the order the saving it had been planned at first to make is cut by some \$50,000,000. No pensions will be reduced more than 25% while the general average of reductions will be 18%.

The president announced that the originally announced pension reductions were more drastic than he had really intended.

#### ELECTION THIS FALL POSSIBLE

Olof Hanson Returns From Session—Visits U. S. Points

Olof Hanson, federal member for this riding, arrived home on last night's train after spending a few days at Smithers. Mr. Hanson says there is a possibility of an election in the fall if Premier Bennett concludes a satisfactory reciprocity treaty with United States. It all lies with Mr. Bennett to call for endorsement of his policy which is a total reversion of his previous policy.

Mr. Hanson was in the United States following the session at Ottawa and he says conditions there have improved. The people in that country believe the nations' meeting at London will take steps to improve conditions. While they have lost faith in conferences generally, they think the London conference really means business.

The session at Ottawa lasted from October 3 to the end of May and was a very trying one.

Mr. Bennett's hands were forced in the matter of reciprocity. At one of the Conservative caucuses one of the Conservative members from the prairies threatened to bring in a non-confidence motion in the House if something were not done within ten days. Before that time expired Mr. Bennett was on the way to Washington.

PALO ALTO, Cal., June 7—Former President Herbert Hoover was among those who attended the funeral here yesterday afternoon of E. P. C. Gregory, trustee of Stanford University, who was killed in an automobile accident last Saturday while returning to his home from a picnic.

#### Canadian Weds Russian Prince



In Toronto, recently, was solemnized the wedding of Mrs. Harry Ross of Victoria, B.C., and Prince Andre Chirinsky-Chihmatoff, of Russian nobility. The former Mrs. Ross is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Butchart, of Victoria. Groom is son of Princess Olga Chihmatoff of Paris and the late Col. Dimitri Shahmatoff Sherinsky, member of the Imperial Guard at Petrograd. The couple met five years ago in Paris, where the prince was in the banking business. They may settle in Canada.

#### England and China in Market For Cottonwood and Alder of Prince Rupert District, Official States

Possibility of Big Business Developing Revealed by District Forester A. E. Parlow at Gyro Club Luncheon Yesterday

Speaking of trade extension which was included in the multifarious activities of the forest service, A. E. Parlow, district forester, in speaking before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday afternoon at its regular weekly luncheon in the Boston Cafe, stated that just recently one inquiry had been received from England and two from China

as to the possibility of obtaining supplies of alder and cottonwood timber from this district. In two cases, the timber was desired for use in the manufacture of veneer and in the other for match splints. In one instance it was suggested that from eight to twelve million feet of timber might be taken if the price were right and conditions suitable.

Mr. Parlow cited these inquiries as instances of how the Forest Branch might be of service in the development of potential business. The inquiries had been referred to operators in the interior.

Another interesting statement made by Mr. Parlow in the course of his talk was in regard to experimental plantings of Douglas fir and other species of timber, which at present did not grow here, in Prince Rupert district. Douglas fir trees which had been thus experimentally planted were now thriving on the Queen Charlotte Islands. As well as Douglas fir, experimental plantings of western white pine, eastern white pine, yellow pine and larch had recently been made in Tolmie Hill Park and McClymont Park at Prince Rupert and at Terrace, Smithers and Burns Lake. 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#### Well Known Employee Of Power Company Is Electrocution Victim

Lost His Life While Engaged in Special Work in Portland Canal District—Was Thirty-Seven Years of Age and Had Made Home Here For Twenty-Four Years

STEWART, June 7:—Alexander McRae, Prince Rupert, lineman in the service of the Northern British Columbia Power Co., lost his life by electrocution at about ten minutes past ten o'clock this morning while working on a pole on the company's high tension line at Hyder, B.C. He had been here from Prince Rupert for the past three weeks on special work for the company. An inquest will be held here by Dr. J. W. Vosburgh, coroner, and the remains, it is expected, will be forwarded to Prince Rupert for burial.

#### MATTERN SPEEDING

American World Flyer Essays 1700-Mile Hop From Omsk to Chita Today

#### Post Preparing

Oklahoma Aviator Prepares to Take to Air in Event of Losing Record

OMSK, Russia, June 7:—Having fallen considerably behind the record of Wiley Post and Harold Gatty as he slept here last night, James J. Mattern, young American aviator, hopped off from here this morning at 4:10 (2:10 p.m. Tuesday, Pacific Standard Time) in continuation of his projected record-breaking flight around the world. His proposed destination on today's hop was Chita, a distance of 1700 miles at which point, if he was able to cover the ground in twelve hours as he had planned, he would again be well ahead of the previous record. Mattern had at first planned to fly today to Irkutsk, a distance of 1200 miles, but, shortly before leaving, announced that he would try the longer hop. His machine was functioning excellently and he was in splendid health and spirits.

#### Passes Nova Siberia

NOVA SIBIRSK, Siberia, June 7: (Canadian Press)—James J. Mattern, American round the world flyer, was reported passing here at 4 o'clock this morning (Pacific Standard Time) after leaving Omsk last night on a 1700-mile lap to Chita but, at the end of fifteen hours, was unreported at his destination.

#### Post to Try Again

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 7:—With Jimmy Mattern, young Texas flyer, bidding fair to eclipse his record of two years ago, Wiley Post, one-eyed Oklahoma aviator, was tuning up his plane Winnie Mae yesterday with a view to setting out in pursuit of Mattern and beating his time. Post, who made the flight in 1931 with Harold Gatty, instead of taking along a mechanic this time plans on using an 80-pound robot as a flying partner.

#### LOST MUCH BY STRIKE

Astoria Estimates That \$300,000 in Revenue Was Lost as Result of Salmon Tie-Up

ASTORIA, Oregon, June 7—Gillnetters and cannery workers of the Columbia River have agreed to end their strike following the acceptance by fishermen of 8c. per pound for blue back salmon.

It was estimated here yesterday that some \$300,000 had been lost in revenue as a result of the recent month's strike which tied up the entire salmon fishing industry on the Columbia River.

#### Pound Sterling and Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange
