At any rate an understanding has been arrived at between Britain and United States which will insure the success of the economic conference which is to be held in June.


PRINCE RUPERT CENTRE

Annual Meeting of Regiment Football Club Held Last Evening

The First North B. C. Regiment Football Club met last evening at the Armory with Captain J. S. Wilson in the chair and a satisfactory attendance of old players, executive and new players.

The report of the secretary-treasurer, G. P. Lyons, for the 1932 season included a statement of games as follows:

Played, 18; won, 11; lost, 5; drawn, 1; and abandoned, 1. The team scored a total of 37 goals with 23 against it. The Regiment team retained the Mobley Cup for the second year in succession, won the Gihuly Cup after a drawn game and was runner-up for the Dominion Day Cup. Oscar Wingham played in every game. Mike Colussi missed one and Pete DeJong but two in the season. Leading goal scorers were: Billy Vance, 8 goals; M. Colussi, 6; Jack Wilson, James Clark and Mark Watson, 4 each.

The average age of the team was under twenty years and, with most of the same players available this year, another successful season is promised. Special attention was drawn to the splendid way in which the players turned out when warned for games, the substitutes always being on hand.

The Eagles and Merchants are seriously considering entering elevens while the Unemployed Council is the latest organization to be discussing the matter. Plenty of talent, including a good many of the youth about to make their debut in senior company, is said to be available and the outlook is for an active, interesting and successful soccer season. Preliminary organization is now well under way with May 1 set as the date for closing of Senior League team entries.

CHICAGO, April 27: (Canadian Press)—There were only minor changes in the Big League baseball standings as a result of yesterday's play.

In the American League, the Detroit Tigers took exclusive possession of fourth place by virtue of a victory over the White Sox at Chicago.

The third place Cleveland Indians moved up towards the second place Chicago White Sox by virtue of a shut-out victory over the St. Louis Browns at Cleveland.

In the National League, Brooklyn Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds moved into a three-way tie for third place with the Phillies as a result of victories over Boston Braves and St. Louis Cardinals respectively, the Cards being relegated to sixth place while the Boston Braves and Chicago Cubs are tied for cellar honors.
