Fear Prevalent Over the World Says Physician

CALGARY, April 27 (Canadian Press) — Extraordinary train of events since 1914 has led to fear becoming more prevalent in individuals, community life and national and international relations, declared Dr. E. P. Scarlett, Calgary physician, in an address here.

In normal, well-balanced individuals, he said, "fear is the emotional aspect of an instinctive process called into action by danger or the prospect of danger—the re-

flexion of the primary instinct of self-preservation."

Dr. Scarlett declared the greater percentage of persons seeking medical care in recent months were suffering from these "anxiety disorders," creating the medical harvest of depression.

Declaring security was a fundamental biological necessity, he explained the great cause of the present increase in anxiety disorders of health was worry over the absence of economic and social security.

The analogy may be extended to the world at large," he said. "A world after the fatigue of war is living under the shadow of a possible destruction of the social

framework. As a result, there is a universal anxiety neurosis."

"The remedy for the world at large in principle is the same for the individual—self-knowledge, not evading the issue and working out the problems in a common sense way as members of an international community. Courage is the supreme quality which has brought man up along the long road that he has travelled from the jungle."

PLANES GET SIGNATURES

United Kingdom Covered and Letter
Presented to Prime Minister
Departing For Geneva

LONDON, April 27: (CP)—Two light aeroplanes were recently employed to make parliamentary history.

Fearful of the course the disarmament conference at Geneva might follow respecting aviation, a letter was drafted by air authorities in London setting forth their fears for presentation to Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald. As the Prime Minister was leaving the following day quick action was necessary if signatures were to be obtained from officials of all provincial flying clubs, flying schools and aircraft operating concerns in England and Scotland.

C. R. Fairley, president of the Royal Aeronautical Society, at once detailed two of his company's test pilots on a Monday after an informal conference at the Royal Aero Club decided on plans. Routes were plotted and arrangements made to warn every aerodrome along the way by telephone of the approximate time of arrival of the flyers.

Early the next morning they left London. Each of them met bad weather—low clouds, rainstorms and adverse winds—but both arrived back in London on Wednesday afternoon. Between them they had flown 1,350 miles and called at 32 aerodromes. Meanwhile, efforts to get those signatures available in London were pushed through successfully and late on Wednesday evening, less than 36 hours after the first signature was got, the letter was in the hands of the Prime Minister.

Many Signatures
Forty-nine organizations connected with British aviation signed the document. After setting out facts emphasizing the unique position of British civil aviation, not only in the United Kingdom but in the Empire, the letter asked for the Prime Minister's personal assurances on four points:

1. That in no circumstances will the British delegates to the disarmament conference be empowered to reach agreements which do not comply with the conditions laid down by the Marquis of Londonderry in his speech at Geneva on February 20.

2. That His Majesty's government will bear incessantly in mind the unique position of the British Empire in aviation while considering any proposals for the imposition of yet more control on the activities of British commercial and private flyers.

3. That no proposals which would restrict the normal progress of civil aviation, either by interference with the liberty of the designer or by hampering the free progress over all parts of the world of the flying vehicle, will receive the slightest measure of support from His Majesty's government.

4. Finally, that in no circumstances will confused thinking on the subject of military and naval aviation and the influence of powerful vested interests be permitted to react disadvantageously on the legitimate expansion and freedom of any branch of British civil aviation.

A letter of acknowledgement dictated before he left for Geneva Mr. MacDonald promised he would bear in mind the considerations set out in the document.
