Prisoners Doing Excellent Work Under Guidance of Sergeant Service

One of the most recent improvements in the city is the clearing of the land between the police station and G. W. Nickerson's home running back to Dr. W. T. Kergin's residence and the making of rockeries and gardens around the police station and on each side of the path leading to the west end of Fourth Avenue. The work has been done by prison labor under direction of Sergeant W. J. Service, city police chief, and is a very great improvement to the whole locality.

The rockeries are constructed in such a manner that, within a year or two, if they are kept up, they will make a real beauty spot. Already a number of plants and shrubs are in evidence and the nasturtiums, the seed for which was donated by Max Heilbronner, make a good showing.

The upper part of the ground is being cleared in such a way that it will become an attractive little park dotted with native trees that will look very well when clover has been sown after all the stumps are removed.

The men who are working on the job are short term prisoners at the local lock-up who have been sentenced to hard labor. They work well on the job, some of them swinging an axe like experts. When doing this work the time passes much more rapidly than if they

were kicking their heels against a bench. Little by little the improvement has been growing until today it indicates that in a very short time the park and gardens will be one of the show places of the city if the interest now shown in it continues.
