Large Cargo of Building Material to be Delivered To Surf Inlet Gold Mine

Presaging an early start on extensive renovation of the old Belmont-Surf Inlet Gold Mining Co.'s plant and facilities at Surf Inlet, the Union Steamship Co.'s freighter Chilliwack, Capt. W. W. Mounce, will be sailing next week from Vancouver with a large cargo of building material for Surf Inlet including 200,000 feet of lumber, seventy creosoted piles and ninety tons of steel.

The old Surf Inlet property was recently taken over by a syndicate headed by J. B. Woodworth of vancouver and the ore is to be treated under a new and more up-to-date method of treatment than that which was used by the former Belmont-Surf Inlet Co. which abandoned the mine some years ago. Success in the financing campaign has resulted in the decision to get the building program under way at this time.
