Briefly Technocracy is a form of socialism closely allied to Marxism except that it minimizes the value of labor instead of glorifying it.

The advocates of technocracy claim that affairs should be administered by engineers rather than by politicians or businessmen.

What is contemplated is a co-operative commonwealth in which everybody will have jobs, goods and leisure.

In the United States the nucleus of a new Technocratic political party is being formed which of course is just another socialist party.

Should it be able to do this it may possibly emerge as America's message to the world, but it seems too early to expect anything like that from United States.
