Log Production for 1932 Totalled 84,056,854 Board Feet or Slightly Lower Than Last Year
Log sealing in Prince Rupert forestry district for the year 1932 amounted to 94,056,854 board feet as compared with 91,884,212 board feet in 1931, a compilation of official figures reveals. Considering the depressed condition of the lumber industry, this is not considered a bad showing.
During the month of December 1932 log production in the district amounted to 152,448 board feet as compared with 521,122 board feet in the same month of 1931. Production per species for the month just ended was as follows:
Cedar 102,222 board feet
Spruce 47,135 board feet
Hemlock 3,091 board feet
Total 152,448 board feet
Timber Products
With the exception of ties, production of timber products during December 1932 was also light. Lined feet of poles and piling totalled 20,090, all of which was cedar, as compared with 32,762 lined feet in December 1931. Forty-seven cords of cordwood was recorded during December 1932 as against 114 cords in December 1931. Hewn ties for December 1932 totalled 8600 pieces, all jackpine, as compared with 2469 pieces in December 1931.

IS URGING M'CAFFERY FOR MAYOR
(Continued from Page 1)

"Today, our entire debt is only \$1,624,900, the whole of which is permanently sold, and not one cent owing to the bank. On the other hand, \$78,560 is on deposit to meet obligations due next April, together with \$48,210 to meet debentures due June 10 next.
"In 1915 our assessment for taxation was \$14,854,757 and tax rate 12.570 mills. In 1917 our assessment valuation for taxation was \$11,596,295 and our tax rate only 10 mills. Property that paid \$140 taxation in 1915 paid only \$31 in 1917.
"Owing to the policy of economy practiced, our local improvement taxation has been reduced from \$148,000 in 1915 to \$81,000 in 1917, so that taxation as a whole has been reduced 55% since taking office.
"Today we stand in the enviable position of having all our obligations provided for—no outstanding debts—with an asset in tax arrears valued at \$178,000 with no pledge against it, together with a reserve fund of \$39,000 to provide interest and redemption charges on our bonded debt.
"Administration charges in all departments have reduced to a minimum consistent with efficiency. General administration of city hall and aldermen's indemnity in 1915 was \$17,308.26; in 1917 was \$14,440. Fire department 1915 was \$13,370. In 1917 was \$12,513. Police department in 1915 cost \$12,370.96; in 1917 the cost was \$11,055, which includes \$1,350 for special service men. Public works, health and utilities were reduced in the same ratio.
"Our tax rate is the lowest of any city west of Winnipeg. The above statement shows the largest reduction of indebtedness concurrent with the reduction of taxes of any city in the west, in the last two years."
