

## LLOYD-GEORGE CAPTURES THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM

At the Hall Where He Was Stoned and Hooted Ten Years Ago, Seventy Thousand People Sought to Hear Him Last Week—Crowds Flocked Even to Catch a Glimpse of Him

Birmingham, England, For an hour and forty minutes on Saturday afternoon the Chancellor of the Exchequer addressed a great meeting at Birmingham Town Hall on his National Insurance Bill.

### A Great Contrast

The visit created an interest and excitement seldom equalled in the Midland capital's turbulent political history. Strangely different on Saturday was the reception given to the Chancellor to that accorded to him when, during the Boer War he visited the same building.

Had Mr. Chamberlain himself been billed to speak in the town hall on Saturday afternoon, the desire to hear him could scarcely have been greater. Applications for tickets numbered 70,000—a figure unprecedented in local history. The hall at a pinch accommodates comfortably some 3,000.

### Throngs to See Him

From twelve o'clock the queues began to assemble, until at 1.30—an hour before the time for beginning—a solid phalanx of ticket-holders six deep surrounded the smoke and dust begrimed hall. In the square were thousands more,

anxious for a glance at the Chancellor, even if they were unable to hear him expound his scheme.

When the most popular statesman of the day drove up to the hall from New-street Station he was loudly cheered by the enormous crowd which had gathered outside, and when he came on the platform he was met with a tremendous outburst of welcome, the whole audience rising and cheering for several minutes.

### Some Notable Phrases

Here are some of the most notable phrases of the speech:

I devoted three years' continuous labour and thought to these proposals, and hope to see the scheme an Act of Parliament within the next three months. I am told that if it took three years in preparation it ought to take more than three months to pass it, but if it took three years to build a house it need not take three years in which to make up your mind as to whether it should be bought.

I am asked: "How can they afford 4d. a week?" I reply, "They pay more now to the pawnbroker. They insure now, but in a most costly and heart-

## INDOOR BASEBALL TEAMS KEEPING IN KEEN FORM

Establishment of League Now Means Addition of Several New and Strong Teams to List—Tonight the Young Business Men Meet to Complete the "Pen-Pushers" Team

Lively interest is continually growing in indoor baseball. Last night the boys of the Baptist Brotherhood engaged in a keen practice match, and from the zest they showed in the game there can be no doubt that they will prove formidable opponents. On almost every night in the week now one or other of the teams may be found occupying the "Diamond" after the evening's rinking. As the players get more and more accustomed to the conditions of light and space at disposal play becomes more and more scientific, and already a fine sprinkling of "star" players is beginning to scintillate amongst the teams.

Challenges from several new teams now being formed are in the air all over, and proposals to start several more teams are being eagerly talked over by the live young men. It is believed that ten good going teams of well

## ROYAL AND MAY IN KEEN RIVALRY

Men Prepared to Back Their Respective Boats with a Month's Pay on Even Terms.

Between the officers and crews of the two C. P. R. steamers the Princess May and Princess Royal there exists a great deal of rivalry, due principally to the fact that the steamers are now fighting out a strenuous duel as to which of them is entitled to the honors of being called the fleetest of the two. About four or five days ago the Royal crew claimed that she had broken the May's former record by several hours.

Later, however, the May got in hers and the officers very kindly and thoughtfully remanded everyone who jollied them at being beaten by the Royal, that they had just made the trip at least 1 hour and 35 minutes faster than the other vessel.

Before the Skagway trade for this year is at a close it is expected that the rivalry between the men will become as intense as that which existed a short time ago between the Princess Victoria and the Princess Charlotte. The men of each vessel are prepared to back their ship with a month's pay on even terms. The two steamers are pretty evenly matched for speed and naturally each ship's crew thinks that their craft has the best of the other.

### FELL DEAD AT PICNIC

## BOMBARDED WITH ROCKS

Westholme Co.'s Gang of Men Imperilled This Morning by Shot Fired on First Avenue.

Apparently without any warning or proper precautions having been taken for the protection of those in the neighborhood, a shot was fired by a station gang on First avenue with perilous and spectacular effect this morning.

A pretty heavy charge had been loaded, and evidently the blanketting used was too light. A number of workmen employed by the Westholme Lumber Co. were endangered. Rocks and large pieces of the blanketting material were flung over 500 feet in all directions falling in a heavy shower around the men.

Two of the men were working high on a scaffold at the time and pieces of rock weighing several pounds struck the boards of the scaffold. Very slightly heavier stones might have brought the structure down and hurt the men.

A complaint has accordingly been laid before Chief Vickers by the Westholme Lumber Co. and the Chief is investigating the matter. The men on the station gang say that they called "fire" and that the shot was properly blanketted.
