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

# PASSING OF

Hadley Hankinson, Twelve-Year Sen of Dr. C. H. Hankinsen, Dies at Solarium

Queen Alexandra Solarium, Cobble Hill, Vancouver Island, of his oldest son, Charles Hadley Hankinson, ove, aged twelve.
