It was first believed that he was suffering from spinal meningitis but, according to later word from the interior, it is thought that it might have been a form of sleeping sickness.

Daniel Foster was born in Prince Rupert and for some years lived here with his parents, his father being a well known locomotive engineer for the Canadian National Railways. Later the family moved from here to Smithers. Besides his parents, he is survived by a sister, Dorothy, who is younger.

The funeral will take place in Smithers on Thursday.

Hotel and Restaurant Proprietors Register Vehement Protest at Meal Tax

VICTORIA, May 30: (CP)-Hos tile public opinion, threatening break out into a storm of protest, is growing throughout British Colum bia against the British Columbia deep regret of the death which took government's "meal tax," author passed at the last session of the Legislature.

> The new levy places a five percent tax on all meals costing more than 50 cents, applied to hotels, restaurants and boarding houses. Certain exemptions are allowed in the cases of boarding house meals and meal tickets. Where paid as board, \$1 per day, \$7 per week or \$28 per month are the exemptons.

Hotel men and boarding house proprietors have inundated the government with protests. A com bined meeting of Victoria and mainland hotelmen passed a resolu tion against absorption of the levy and appointed a delegation to pro test to the government. One prominent hotel man said the new tax threatens to drive the tourist trade
