One of the paragraphs from a speech made in Vancouver by T. D. Pattullo says: "Work and wages. Work at the prevailing rate of wages. It can be done and it will be done."

That is undoubtedly what people are today wanting. The men who have been trying to live on relief allowances are tired of it. The business people who have been trying to get along with nobody earning are tired. Everybody is tired of unemployment. Pattullo has again and again pledged himself to tackle the problem immediately he is elected and to set the men to work. It is a practical policy and one that will benefit everybody. It is better than the visionary schemes put forward by some who think work is not a necessity. It is better than the lack of policy of the leaderless candidates passing under the guise of independence.

There is every indication that people are turning to the strong leader in this juncture and that pretty soon we shall find the unemployed working and everyone else busy as a result of the return of the only group with a real policy and a real leader.

COTTONWOOD FOR ORIENT

Local Chamber of Commerce Hears Reports in Regard to Possibilities of Exporting Timber

Correspondence from J. A. Langley, commercial secretary of the Canadian legation at Tokyo, and from Bruce A. MacDonald, assistant trade commissioner at Shanghai, in regard to the development of a market in the Orient for local cottonwood was read at last night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and referred to the timber committee.

The letter from Mr. Langley stated that the consumption of Canadian cottonwood in Japan at present did not amount to much, that country preferring the Russian timber because of its color in the manufacture of match sticks. Mr. Langley considered that the marketing possibility for the British Columbia timber might be greater in China than in Japan.

Mr. MacDonald stated that Chinese buyers had shown interest in the B.C. timber a short time ago but there was now an over-production of Chinese matches and the interest had now lessened. He suggested that samples of local cottonwood logs be sent to China so that the suitability of the timber in match manufacture might be ascertained.

Several local single unemployed men were taken south last night aboard the steamer Princess Adelaide and will be placed in a relief camp near Vancouver.




