CONFIDENT ATTITUDE

Prince Rupert has been slow in developing but there is no doubt of its ultimately becoming a very important city if not a great city and seaport. The growth of most cities has been slow until they reach a certain stage of development.

It is not necessary to recount here and now the reasons why Prince Rupert is destined for great things. They have been said so often that it is futile to repeat. Local residents all know them. What is needed is a greater confidence expressed in speaking with strangers. Let it be granted that the reason we are all here is because we have faith in the town. If we had not we should be elsewhere. Let us then adopt a confident attitude. Let us tell the world that we believe in Prince Rupert, that we are in Prince Rupert because we like to be here and because we believe it is the best place in the world for us.

USEFUL BUT NOT VITAL

The London conference can prove very useful but its deliberations are not vital to the recovery of the world from the depression which is already passing as rapidly as it safely may. Great things were expected of it and great things may yet be achieved although it is doubtful if it will have any very material permanent effect on the progress of the world. Possibly the foundation may be laid for future deliberations which may deal with the same questions from a different angle.

TIME TO THINK

With the price of commodities rising and with the roar of prosperity heard in the distance it is time for statesmen and all citizens to consider what may be done to prevent a repetition of the condition through which we have been passing. Eight or ten years from now we may, in the ordinary course of events, expect another financial slump. Shall we go through another tense period then or shall we take steps to avert it before it comes?

IS LAID AT REST

Miss Muriel Stephens of Smithers Passed Away Suddenly

The funeral took place from St. James Anglican Church in Smithers on Wednesday afternoon of last week. Rev. L. J. Hales officiating, of Miss Muriel Stephens, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph G. Stephens, whose death occurred suddenly on Monday morning following a brief illness. Miss Stephens, whose father is station agent at Smithers, was taken suddenly ill while at work on Wednesday. On Sunday she took a very bad turn and, following a consultation of physicians, her ailment was diagnosed as peritonitis resulting from a ruptured appendix and an immediate operation was decided upon. Early the next morning death occurred.

Miss Stephens, who was highly popular in Smithers, took an active part in community affairs. She was president of the Anglican Young People's Association, active in all other spheres of church work and secretary of the Ladies of the Royal Purple Lodge. Besides her parents, she is survived by a sister and brothers. She was approaching her twenty-first birthday.

NO CUT IN SALARIES

Stewart People Decide to Continue to Pay Teachers Present Wages During Coming Year

STEWART, July 11.—The annual meeting of the ratepayers of the Stewart Superior School district was held at the school on Saturday last, and was one of the best attended school meetings ever held here.

The trustees' reports and auditor's statement for the year 1932-33 were adopted and funds voted for the ensuing year. The trustees reported a balance on hand of \$783.57 and the meeting voted an appropriation of \$3500, making the available funds for the year \$4,283.57. Estimated expenditures are \$4,015.00 and estimated surplus at the end of the year, \$268.57.

Owing to the drastic reductions in basic salaries and consequently in government grants for salaries of teachers there was considerable discussion on reduction of local salaries but the meeting passed a resolution instructing the trustees to maintain the teachers' salaries at the same figure as for the year just closed.

The retiring trustee, P. S. Jack, secretary of the board, was re-elected by acclamation for a further term of three years. Mr. Jack has already served on the school board for 12 years. L. S. Davidson was elected auditor.

It was announced that Miss Margaret McLean of the teaching staff had resigned her position.

At the close of the meeting a hearty vote of thanks was passed to members of the board, W. R. Tooth, Joseph H. Wilson and P. S. Jack, for their excellent services during the past year.

A rally by the Canucks in the fifth canto which netted them four markers and added to their previous three runs was sufficient to beat the revamped Elks, the game winding up with a 7 to 6 score.

It was a snappy ball game, everybody was knocking the old pill around and the fielders were kept hustling to keep the run total as low as it was.

Elks started the scoring from the opener, Mitchell crossing the plate after hitting a double, the first lusty swat of the game. He also was good for a triple in the fourth. The Antlered Herd got to Stiles for five more runs up to the fifth inning. "Sonny" allowed extra base hits by Nelson, Commons and Kennedy besides Mitchell's hard swats. The big boy was relieved by Lambie who was in his usual good mood, blanketing the Dodgers with hitless ball besides being chalked up with the win.

Commons, troubled with a sore leg, twirled fair ball, holding the Sons' heavy artillery down to six scratch bingles besides Comadina's three-base blow to the right field garden that brought home two runs in the disastrous fifth inning. "Ham" Antonelli played good ball for one of his first times out in senior company and held down the hot corner for the Elks like a veteran.
