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CURIOUS SITUATION

According to a despatch received from Vancouver, the members of the Conservative executive cannot agree on the question of leadership so they have thrown up their hands, so far as the coming election is concerned. They have announced that Conservatives may nominate either union or Conservative candidates.

This lines Mr. Bowser up definitely with the Conservative party for Conservatives are instructed to support either union or Conservative candidates.

The union cause in Vancouver has received a serious blow because of the dropping of the morning paper by H. B. Thompson, chief lieutenant of Mr. Bowser, who took it over for a short time with the idea of operating it in support of the Bowser-Conservative party. He did not like paying the deficit each week so again Vancouver is without a morning paper and the Bowser group is without a newspaper. The fact that he could not get advertising for his paper from Vancouver merchants did not seem to indicate that the Vancouver merchants were very enthusiastic for the cause he was espousing.

Dr. Tolmie is being deserted by a number of his former supporters and is left without a central organization. Mr. Bowser's cause has flopped of late. T. D. Pattullo says his government when it is formed, will represent all provincial interests, or in other words, it will be a union government. In addition there are several minor groups putting up candidates. Possibly by the time the election is held the situation will be clarified and voters will be in a better position to know what to do. Just now it seems as if Pattullo is the only man capable of dealing with the present situation effectively.

COMMENT ON PATTULLO'S ADDRESS

Editor, Daily News:—

I would like to comment briefly on the suggestion made by T. D. Pattullo in regard to the creation of an economic council in B. C. The time has arrived when the direction of the main industries of the country must comply with the necessities of national economy and not be left to the absolute discretion of the individual.

The present struggle is between extreme individualism or free competition, on one hand, and solidarity of production, on the other. The lack of co-operation between all the forces of production and distribution bring about chaos and unemployment.

The direction of enterprise must be subordinated to a national advisory board of experts, selected from the best men of the different branches of production, exchange and finance, so as to avoid abuses, duplication, ill-considered planning, speculation at public expense and waste.

Mr. Editor, we must realize that the fundamental wrong is excessive individualism and lack of co-operation.

A new social organization is necessary to meet the new situation. The creation of a national council of economy is merely one of the necessary steps towards the new

government requirements to adjust future economic relations.

The next important plank is the one to adjust the rate of interest on money in keeping with the present condition so as to enable the taxpayers to carry on. This is a very important measure as it is utterly impossible for the public to meet the excessive rate of interest of 6% and 7%.

Mr. Pattullo pledges his administration to mobilize the credit of the nation to provide work at a fair wage. This should meet the endorsement of every citizen because work is the only thing that will break the vicious circle of unemployment and restore normal economic conditions.
