Canadian Defeated in Sixth Round In British Amateur Golf Champicuship Tournament

HOYLAKE, Eng., June 22: (Canadian Press)-George T. Dunlap jr. of New York today eliminated C. Ross Somerville of London, Ont., in the sixth round of the British amateur golf championship two and one.

H. L. Holden of Bowdon eliminated Jack Nash of London, Ont., at the nineteenth hole in the sixth round.

Somerville and Nash were the two final Canadians in play.

HOYLAKE, Eng., June 22: (Canadian Press)-Ross Somerville of London, Ont., advanced to the fifth round of the British amateur golf championship yesterday, defeating J. Walker, Coombe Hill, 6 and 5.
