NEW TYPE AIR FILM

Unusual Picture to be New Year's Feature at Capitol Theatre

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Dry Dock to be Busier—International Fisheries Commission Schooner Here—Local Scientist Interested in New Fisheries Product

Busier days, with a substantial increase in the number of men employed, are in immediate prospect for the local dry dock, starting with the repair job on the steamer Prince George, which commenced this week and will probably occupy the better part of the next two months with some forty or fifty men at work. After the Prince George is ready to go back into commission, the Prince Rupert will return to the yard to undergo her annual overhaul and, by the time that is done, the usual spring work on fishing vessels such as halibut boats, fish packers, etc. will be offering. It is stated that, as far as the dry dock is concerned, a good four months' work on a larger scale than the yard has enjoyed for many a moon is now in sight. And, of course, nobody can foretell what the summer may bring forth. It is encouraging, to say the least, to see a definite improvement in the outlook for the immediately ensuing few months which are usually very quiet at the yard.

Bringing in from Anyox four lifeboats and a workboat belonging to the steamer Prince George, which craft had been left at the smelter town following the stranding of the vessel near there last week, the Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug and service boat Salvage Princess, Capt. Charlie Larkin, returned to port yesterday afternoon from Anyox. The vessel, which was sheathed in ice forming from flying spray, had a rather awkward tow and found the going rather tough in view of rather unfavorable weather conditions, but came through safely just the same.

The arrival of three coast passenger vessels from the south lived up the local waterfront considerably yesterday. With twenty passengers on board, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 9 o'clock in the morning and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other Alaska points on a regularly scheduled voyage from which she is due back here southbound next Tuesday afternoon. Two passengers disembarked from the vessel here while two went north from this port aboard her. At 2:45 in the afternoon Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, and the C. P. R. Princess Adelaide, with Capt. Albert Rippon in command in place of the regular skipper, Capt. Steve Gray, who is ashore in Vancouver on annual vacation, made their appearance, one right behind the other, the Cardena tying up at the Canadian National dock and the Adelaide at her regular berth at the government wharf. The Cardena sailed at midnight on her return south and the Adelaide at 6 p.m., four hours ahead of time, with a view to reaching Vancouver at 7 o'clock Sunday night, New Year's Eve, instead of 7 a.m. Monday, her regularly scheduled time of arrival at the southern port. Both the Cardena and Adelaide had exceptionally light passenger lists.

Looking For Logs
The Armour Salvage Co. on Friday morning dispatched the halibut boat White Hope, Capt. Pete Thompson, to Rocky Bay, Calvert Island, just north of Queen Charlotte Island, with a view to picking up as much as possible of a Davis raft of pulpwood logs which broke away from the tug Lorne some two weeks ago while being brought north from Seymour Inlet, a logging camp, to Ocean Falls pulp and paper mill. The Lorne lost her Davis raft in Queen Charlotte Sound at the same time as did the St. Faith in Hecate Straits.

Capt. W. F. Bussey, owner and skipper of the local halibut boat Atl has been suffering during the past week from the effects of an operation for appendicitis but is now reported to be making a good recovery. He has now been in hospital for about a week and will probably be there for the next ten days at least.

Charlie Batt, well known local halibut fisherman is confined to his home on Ninth Avenue East suffering from a severe attack of pneumonia.

Word comes from Capt. and Mrs. Merrill Sollows saying that they have been having a very enjoyable holiday near Yarmouth in their

native state. They will spend the most of the winter near Yarmouth, N.B., being expected back here by early spring.

Leading Seaman Jack Macfie, Leading Stoker Matt Harris, Able Seaman William Bremner and Ordinary Seaman Morris Maguire and Douglas Christison of the local unit of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve sailed Thursday night on the Prince Rupert for Esquimaut where they will start extended courses of naval training which will include a cruise on either H. M. C. S. Skeena or H. M. C. S. Vancouver. The boys expect to be away until well on into the spring, possibly till the middle of May.

To Buy Fish Here

According to reports which are now current at Prince Rupert, Edmunds & Walker, enterprising new fisheries concern, which a year or so ago took over the operation of the New Westminster cold storage plant, will join the ranks of regular buyers and shippers of fresh and frozen halibut at the port of Prince Rupert next season. Last season, this company handled considerable halibut through the Westminster plant and also at Claxton cannery on the Skeena River where it operated the freezing facilities which had been put in a few years ago by the B. C. Packers. Next year, however, it is understood the concern will make fresh halibut shipments through Prince Rupert to the eastern markets. Edmunds & Walker were also quite active last year in the handling of fresh salmon from the troll fishermen in Prince Rupert district.

After having spent a month in Gulf of Alaska waters engaged in scientific research work, the big Seattle halibut schooner Eagle, Capt. Jacob Engdal, under charter to the International Fisheries Commission, arrived in Prince Rupert on Thursday night to outfit for a period of intensive work in British Columbia waters off the Queen Charlotte Islands. It is planned to leave on New Year's Eve. On board the Eagle is a party of five members of the scientific staff of the International Fisheries Commission with John L. Kusk, formerly of Prince Rupert, in charge, the others being Lawrence Townsend, Olaf Eriksen, Francis Wood and W. E. Hamilton.

It is reported to be already winning considerable popularity.
