PREMIER PATTULLO TO ARRIVE IN CITY TOMORROW EVE

Head of Balkan Country's New Government Is Shot By Member Of Outlawed Anti-Jewish Body

BENNETT TO BE ON AIR

Premier of Canada to Address People of Canada Over Radio On New Year's Eve

The incoming of the year 1934 will, as last year, be signalized on New Year's Eve by a brief message from the Prime Minister of Canada, Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett. According to present arrangements, Mr. Bennett will speak over a nation-wide hook-up of the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission at 6 p.m. Pacific Standard Time, probably from Ottawa, but, if he is elsewhere, his message will be picked up wherever he happens to be. The address will be carried, among other western stations, by CFMN of Calgary and CFCV of Vancouver.

Premier Bennett Indicates Resumption of Awarding of Titles in Canada This Year

OTTAWA, Dec. 30: (CP)—Premier R. B. Bennett last night expressed the opinion that conferring of honors by the King upon Canadians should be resumed and announced that recommendations had been made that certain Canadians should share in the New Year list of "honors and awards" by His Majesty. This indication that honors would again be conferred upon Canadians after a lapse of some years came as a general surprise.

It is understood here that Hon. George Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner at London, and Hon. Lyman Duff, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, may be included in the New Year's honor list.

Four Shots Fired Into Dunca's Head as He Left Royal Palace After Seeing King—Explosion in Royal Coach at Railway Station Today

SINAIA, Roumania, Dec. 30: (CP)—Premier Ion G. Dunca, head of Roumania's new National Liberal government and an outstanding figure in the international fight to suppress the rising wave of anti-Semitism in Europe, was assassinated here last night by a student member of the anti-Jewish Iron Guard which he outlawed a few weeks ago. Four shots were fired into the Premier's head. The assassination took place as the Premier was leaving the royal palace where he had been calling upon the King. He had been for thirty-six years a member of Roumania's Parliament.

The city was further stirred today when an explosion wrecked King Carol's coach in the railway station, injuring a child. The incident took place while a large crowd was awaiting the departure of a train carrying the slain Premier Dunca to Bucharest. The crowd was thrown into a panic. The cause of the explosion was not clear.

Premier Infant Is Found Dead

Clot in Bloodstream Due to Valvular Heart Trouble Causes Death of Kathleen Cameron

Kathleen, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Cameron of Premier, was found dead in bed on Wednesday of this week, according to information received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here. A post-mortem examination was made by Dr. W. S. Kergin who found that death had been due to natural causes, valvular trouble of the heart having caused a clot in the bloodstream. Cameron is an employee of the Premier Gold Mining Co.

Hunger Marchers Invade Paris



Some cheering enthusiastically and others grimly silent, hunger marchers from the French provinces arrived at the gates of Paris after a long tedious journey afoot. France is at present facing the same crisis which confronted the United States a short time ago, with starving men, women and children flocking to the nation's capital for aid. Plans for drastic economies and new taxes are before the French Chamber of Deputies, which is divided between holding confidence in the new premier and backing up the pleas of committees of taxpayers who are hotly opposing the taxation increases as unemployment grows.

TOO COLD TO RECORD

Thermometer at Nahlin in Northern B. C. Drops to 70 Below

Nahlin, a post on the Government Telegraphs Yukon Trail between Telegraph Creek and Atlin, recording 102 degrees below freezing point, puts in a bid today for the distinction of being the coldest point in Canada. The operator there reported this morning that his thermometer read 70 below zero and would go no lower. Zero and sub-zero readings are reported from the central interior and such coast points as Anyox and Stewart.

"BILLY THE JAP" DIES

Well Known Oriental Passes Away At Hospital

Tsuzo Takeda, better known as "Billy the Jap," passed away at 6 o'clock Thursday evening at the Prince Rupert General Hospital following a brief illness. He was 78 years of age and had lived in British Columbia for fifty years. He had been in and around Prince Rupert since railway construction days and was one of the first settlers on Porcher Island. More recently he had been in charge of a fox farm at White Cliff Island for Dr. W. T. Kergin and J. H. Pillsbury of this city.

B. C. Undertakers are in charge of funeral arrangements and interment will take place on Sunday afternoon with Rev. T. Matsumoto, local Anglican Japanese missionary, officiating.

B. C. Prime Minister Sounds Note of Hope In New Year Message

VANCOUVER, Dec. 30: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo and Major S. F. M. Moodie, assistant premier, sailed on the steamer Catala last night for Prince Rupert where they will arrive on Sunday evening, entraining on New Year's Day from the northern city for Ottawa where they will attend the Dominion and interprovincial premier's conference opening January 17.
