

TO PROTECT DUMB ANIMALS FROM CRUEL TREATMENT

H. A. Robinson, Provincial Inspector for the Society For Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Will Start Branch in the City—Meeting on Wednesday

"Yes, Prince Rupert in its present stage is rather a heavy city for horses, but I am pleased to say that every horse I have seen so far in the city seems in splendid condition."

These are the words of H. A. Robinson, Provincial Inspector of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in B. C. He arrived in the city yesterday by train after journeying from Hazelton where he has been busy for a few weeks, and it is his intention to re-organise the Prince Rupert branch of the S. P. C. A. Probably because of the excellent care taken of their horses by teamsters here, and the general kindness shown by the people of Prince Rupert to dogs and other animals, the branch of the society here has not been very prominent. But it is as well to have it live all the same.

Meeting on Wednesday

The Mayor will preside over a meeting on Wednesday night at 8 o'clock in the police court room with this object in view. Mr. Robinson will be there, and as many citizens of both sexes are interested in the proper care of animals should certainly attend. President, secretary and office-bearers will be appointed. Mr. H. Gowan is General Secretary for B. C. and Captain Deloraine President, while for Vancouver branch Captain A. H. Reid is President, and F. Sweetman Secretary. Major Gibson has acted as Secretary for the society branch temporarily established some time ago in Prince Rupert.

A Recommendation

Mr. Robinson intends to suggest through the society that a bylaw should be formulated for this city providing that single rigs carrying

ten hundredweight should be fitted with brakes, and double rigs carrying one ton should be braked also. This for the protection of the horses on the temporarily steep streets. Regarding the hauling of dump wagons on rails, Mr. Robinson remarked that he was pleased to see that the contractors are careful to provide good footholds where the teams start the pull. After the wagon is going it is fairly easy to haul. He commented favorably on R. A. McMordie's wire rope and engine system of haulage.

Happened in Hazelton

Mr. Robinson's trip to Hazelton was with a view to looking into the conditions of the horses used by the Indians. He found them generally in very good condition, but noticed one or two cases where the matter of shoeing had been so badly neglected that the hoofs were worn to the quick.

A bartender named Harry Lalande was fined \$100.00 and costs for having cruelly thrown ammonia into a dog's eye, destroying the animal's sight. Two dogs had to be destroyed, one because it was diseased, and the other owing to extreme decrepitude. Magistrate Price Ellison presided over the court cases, the ammonia case, and one of working a horse suffering from box-spavin.

Mr. Robinson was impressed with the prospects of the Hazelton district particularly the coal claims around Ground Hog Mountain.

Asked whether he thought it might possibly be "cruelty to wives" to take them into the still undeveloped districts awaiting the rails, he laughingly replied that all the wives he had met there were capable and happy housekeepers enjoying their share in their husbands' pioneering.

MANY PICNIC PARTIES THIS GLORIOUS WEEK END

In Radiant Sunshine Hundreds of Happy Prince Rupert People Spent Their Hours in the Open Boat—ing, Canoeing and Mountain Climbing

For the past three months, as everybody readily agrees, the weather in Prince Rupert has been so fine that only one positively rainy day can be remembered in the period. But with the superb sunshine and clear atmosphere of the past three or four days Prince Rupert has surpassed itself. As a result the weekend saw

numerous long distance picnic parties setting off for the beauty spots within a day's march of Prince Rupert.

Woodworth and Shawatlans

On Saturday afternoon a party crossed in boats to Shawatlans Passage, portaged their canoes to Shawatlans Lake, and paddling to the head of the lake where is

situated the pretty little island, picnicked there. Some members of the party including several ladies, afterwards hit the trail for Lake Woodworth from which the water supply for Prince Rupert will be drawn in about a year. The beauty of this lake high up amongst the mountains, filled with clear cold water from the grand snow capped peaks above and around it, is ideal. Down to Shawatlans there tumbles a stream, the haunt of many a fine trout, and Shawatlans Lake itself is an ideal spot, forest girth, with the reflections of the trees clear mirrored in its depths.

Scaled the Mountain

Determined to conquer the mountain at the back of the townsite several energetic parties set forth on Sunday. Some of the parties were composed of mere males only, garbed for the rugged scramble, but City Clerk Woods included in his party his plucky young wife, and her friend Mrs. Derry. Mr. Woods' party made the ascent with full picnic equipment, and achieved the summit in fine time. The advantage of having the ladies with them came out when the tea was brewed after the hot scramble. The City Clerk declares it was the most refreshing tea he ever tasted. On their return at about eleven p.m. all of the party including the ladies, were fresh and gay as if they had not just done at least seven of the steepest miles within a day's march of Prince Rupert, and carried sheaves of beautiful ferns which fill the dells on the mountain side.

Some of the "mere male" parties had the time of their lives going up the mountain, but at least twice that coming down. What with the tender twining tendrils of the dainty Devil's Club on the mountainside, and the fragrant glades in the jungle of skunk cabbage at the base, the boys had heavy going. But they got into town again in the greatest of good humor each and all.

Yesterday's Picnics

The waterfront yesterday was as busy as it has ever been this summer Coronation Day not excepted. A note of some of the principal picnic parties leaving by launch is interesting:

Mr. L. Patmore, with Mrs. Patmore, her mother and family, also Mr. Macdonald of the Customs Department, City Assessor J. C. McLennan, and Mr. Rochester went by launch from the Rupert Marine stage to Shawatlans Lake, and spent a pleasant afternoon.

Mr. Grossman and party went by launch to Metlakatla, and City Engineer Davis went with a party including several councillors to Digby Island.

Another party consisting of Alderman Hilditch, J. E. Merryfield, and others went to Shawatlans, and remaining until late kirkled a glowing camp fire. A rumor round town to the effect that they were mistaken for Indians as they sat in the gathering shadows about the blaze may as well be passed over.

All day boats were coming and going on the harbor, and many of the shorter distance parties spent great good times just across from the city.
