VICTORIA, Aug. 2:- The decision of Magistrate J. A. Findlay in Vancouver that the B. C. Hospitals Aid Act imposing tax on the consumer of every meal at a restaurant or hotel of the value of 50c or over was an excise tax and therefore ultra vires of the Legislature will be appealed by the government. It will be argued before the higher court that the tax is not akin to an excise impost and is therefore valid and within the competence of the Legislature.

Collection of the tax will be continued, Attorney General Pooley stated.
