deliberations. Before anything could be accomplished, it was essential that God's kingdom on earth should be accepted as a practical reality.

What World Has to Do

The world had to get away from thinking that God was far removed and lived only in Heaven, declared the speaker. People were inclined to worry too much about the here-after and forget the present. Worry and not work was killing people.

Delving deep into Biblical history, Mr. Springett described how God had chosen a family to demonstrate his will and carry out his plan. The head of this family had been Abraham, the father of Isaac, out of whose loins God had promised would spring many peoples, many nations and many kings.

Mr. Springett asked if the people of today in choosing men who should govern their affairs selected, as God had laid down, men who feared God, loved truth and hated covetousness. Did it not appear that such men were a necessary factor in forming the parliaments and governments whose mission should be not to make laws but to administer the law as set down in the Book?

"God still rules his people," declared the speaker in closing, "but his kingdom must be established and upon you people rests the responsibility of re-establishing that kingdom."

At the conclusion of his address, a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Springett by Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral. Rev. F. W. Dufoe, pastor of First Baptist Church, presided and offered the opening prayer. The benediction was pronounced by Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia. W. Vaughan Davies presided at the organ. P. H. Linzey, Robert Gordon and Samuel Massey acted as ushers.

Afternoon Meeting

Close to one hundred women attended an afternoon meeting in St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral at which Mr. Springett also spoke. Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of the Cathedral, presided. There was a vocal solo by Mrs. J. H. McLeod.
