### DOCTRINE OF ISRAEL

Commissioner of British-Israel Federation is Impressive Speaker

### New Order Coming

British Commonwealth as "Chosen of God" Will Lead World Out

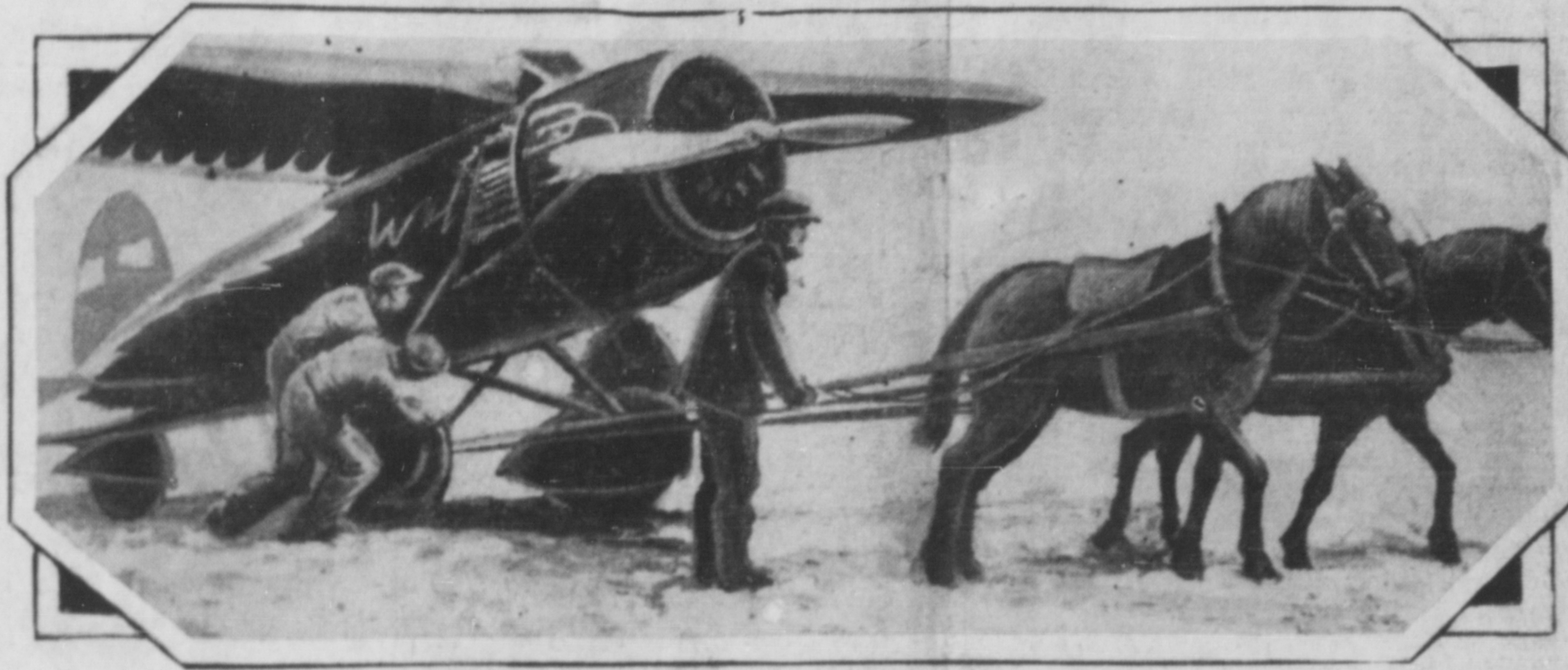
Declaring that the world economic crisis was in the nature of a "great agony of travail" preceding the birth of a new and more perfect social order of things which would fall to be brought about by any form of government, conference or treaty of human device but which could only be achieved by the acceptance by the people of God's Kingdom on earth as a practical reality in all phases of life and activity, Rev. E. J. Springett of Toronto, commissioner of the British-Israel Federation of Canada, delivered a tremendously inspiring address last night in First Baptist Church here. The audience, taxing the capacity of the church, was representative of all religious denominations in the city and all walks of life.

Mr. Springett, in an intensely interesting manner, unfolded the belief of the British-Israel Federation of the British Empire as being the "chosen people of God," giving frequent Biblical references in support of this theory and applying the doctrine as the ultimate solution of the present ills under which the world was laboring. Declaring that only by British genius could have been brought about the wonderful organization of the British Commonwealth of Nations, which was bound together by no legal ties but merely by respect, love and sympathy, and predicting the practical return of the United States to the British fold at an early date, Mr. Springett asserted that this alliance of 500,000,000 peoples, "the marvel of the ages," would ere long be instrumental in ushering in an era of world peace and perfect social order such as had not been previously known. With this "theostatic state" would, as promised by God, come the return of Jesus Christ to reign over the House of Israel forever. The world was at the impasse now and there might be greater depression and greater conflict but eventually would come the day of repentance when God's Law would be accepted and the great cry would be heard "Behold the King is Coming."

In opening, Mr. Springett alluded to the readiness of the people of today, racked by the trials of the depression, to talk in terms of religion. It was also agreed by thinking people of today that a tremendous change must be brought about in the conduct of government, industry, finance, economic and religious matters. Out of the decay of the old order of things would come the concept and development of the new perfect order. Today the world might be said to be in the "agony of travail" preceding its rebirth. Soon would come the demand for action. Basically speaking, there had been no improvement as yet in economic matters, declared the speaker, in referring to present world conditions. The League of Nations had been a failure as had also been the world economic conference. Nothing else could have been expected of them as they were based on paganism and had left out God's plan in their

From Nome, it is planned that Mattern shall fly to New York in completion of his globe circumnavigation by air.

### Wiley Post Hops Off On New World Flight; Two Lithunians Also

One-Eyed Aviator Hopes to Make Solo Trip Around Earth—Europeans Started 5,000-Mile Air Grind From New York to Native Home

NEW YORK, July 15: (Canadian Press)—Two trans-Atlantic airplane flights started from here today. Wiley Post of Oklahoma took off this morning headed out over the ocean in the monoplane Winnie Mae, in which he and Harold Gatty set up a world's record two years ago for globe circumnavigation, on a solo attempt to fly around the world. Aided by an 80-pound robot in place of a flying companion, the one-eyed Post plans flying via Alaska and Edmonton and thence back to New York. At 1:10 p.m. Eastern Standard Time he was reported to have passed Torbay, Nfld.

Also this morning the monoplane Lithuanica, flown by two Lithuanian-Americans, started a five thousand mile non-stop flight to Lithuania. The flyers are Stephen Darius and Stanley Girenas of Chicago. They took off without permission from Washington. No arrangements have been made for their flying over intervening countries and, if they land in between, they may be in an embarrassing position.

### Pushing Tunnel on Island Gold Mine

Vein Widening As Drifting Proceeds Into Prince Rupert Group On Moresby

SKIDEGATE, July 15—The latest report from the Prince Rupert group of gold claims on the west coast of Moresby Island, which is under development by the Haida Gold Mines Ltd., states that the main tunnel is now in forty-seven feet and that the vein is widening all the time.

The ship's complement consists of 450 of all ratings. The ship is one of the "D" Class cruisers, several of which have visited Prince Rupert from time to time. She was launched in 1918. She is 472 feet in length, and is of 4,650 tons registry. The ship is equipped with six six-inch guns, three four-inch guns, four three-pounders, two two-pounder pom-poms, and 12 twenty-one-inch torpedo tubes.
