

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Sockeye Salmon Run is Fair and Normal—Halibut Landings Still Ahead of Last Year—Local Boats On Pilchard Packing Charters

In view of cool and cloudy weather conditions which were not favorable to fishing and for this time of year, the run of sockeye salmon on the Skeena and Naas Rivers is fair and normal, it is stated in official quarters. Particularly if weather improves it is expected that there will be a considerable improvement by mid-July. Meantime the gillnetters are catching from one to twenty-five fish per day with the boats averaging nine or ten fish. Latest reports from the southern portion of No. 2 fishing district are to the effect that the boats are averaging four or five fish.

With some boats having moved out and some licences being cancelled, the total number of fishing licences on the Skeena River now is just under 1100, the limit before imposition of an additional twelve hours of weekly close season. The weekly close season is now from 6 p.m. Friday until 6 p.m. Sunday.

With the vessel not required for the owners' New Massett salmon cannery which is not in operation this season, the Massett Cannery Ltd. has secured a salmon packing charter for its cannery tender Jew-way on the West Coast of Vancouver Island and the vessel left Prince Rupert yesterday to take up the work. Capt. Johnny Hartlin was in command with Fred Brooks-bank shipping as engineer.

There is still a good demand for red spring salmon and the wiser of the trollers on the principal grounds are making the most of the good prices while they last. Some of the boats are cleaning up nicely although that does not mean that they are not all working hard for everything they get. Up to 8c is reported to have been paid during the past week at North Island. Nelson Bros. Ltd., packing into Seattle, Edmund & Walker, to New Westminster; the New England Fish Co. to Butedale, and the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., to Prince Rupert, are still the principal purchasers.

Latest reports from the Queen Charlotte Islands are to the effect that the most of the vessels of the Skidegate fleet, which had been operating on the Hippo Island grounds, have now moved to North Island where there is a better run.
