FEDERAL AND PROVINCIAL

It seems that T. D. Pattullo knew what he was talking about when he said that Premier Bennett would be forced to take action to remedy the present condition. It is now intimated from Ottawa that a national campaign to provide work for the unemployed and to pay them wages is to be instituted. That is directly in line with Mr. Pattullo's announcement months ago.

Mr. Woodsworth, member of the Dominion Parliament, having injected himself into the provincial fight on behalf of the C. C. F., it is now announced that Hon. Ian McKenzie of Vancouver and Tom Reid of New Westminster will tour the province between now and election day in the interests of the provincial Liberal party. Captain McKenzie is one of the orators of the federal party and Tom Reid is a speaker of no mean ability. It is understood they will visit Prince Rupert and other parts of Northern and Central British Columbia.

H. D. TWIGG'S RETIREMENT

It is a matter for extreme regret that H. D. Twigg, member for Victoria in the recently dissolved legislature, is not to continue in politics. He was looked upon by many as the hope of the Conservative party in this province. In the war he took part in the fighting overseas and was prominent in connection with the activities of the returned soldier organizations since then. As deputy speaker of the Legislature and as organizer for the Conservatives he did good work and he is still full of vigor. It is to be hoped that, if he does not reconsider his decision during the present campaign, he will at any rate find himself impelled to take part in political activities at some more suitable time. Possibly he may enter federal politics.

Prince Rupert on Mystery Cruise at End of This Week

In view of the success of the excursion to Port Simpson last week-end, Canadian National Steamships announce that the steamer Prince Rupert will be used for another outing this Saturday, the trip on this occasion to take the form of a "mystery cruise," commencing at 1:30 in the afternoon and returning to port at 10 p.m.

Capt. Neil McLean, will receive sealed orders shortly before the ship sails, these not to be opened until after the liner leaves the harbor. Meantime, the destination will remain unknown to all on board. Such "mystery cruises" have proven very popular in the past in Vancouver.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 7. (CP)—The leading New York Giants and second place Pittsburgh Pirates continued their crucial series in the National League pennant race here yesterday by dividing honors in a double-header as a result of which six and a half games still separate the two clubs. Meanwhile, the Chicago Cubs crept up to within one game of the Pirates by winning a close verdict over the fourth place Boston Braves at Wrigley Field while the St. Louis Cardinals took a double-header from the Phillies at St. Louis to approach within one and a half games of the Braves.

In the American League, the Washington Senators won again by defeating the Chicago White Sox at the national capital while the New York Yankees, assisted by Lou Gehrig's twenty-fourth home run of the season, kept pace by eking out a close victory over the St. Louis Browns at the Yankee Stadium.
