VANCOUVER, Dec. 19:-The Pacific Coast rum running boot now appears to be on the other foot as far as this coast is concerned. Whereas the illicit liquor used to travel from Canada to the United States, the abolition of the dry laws in Uncle Sam's country make it appear that it may now be profitable to attempt to smuggle liquor from the United States in the opposite direc-
