British Hygiene Council Says 27 For Men and 25 For Women

LONDON, Nov. 27: - What are the best ages for parenthood? Dr. Lilian Jeffries, speaking at the summer school of the British Hygiene Council at Oxford said the ages at which the best children were produced were 27 in the man and 25 in the

Regretting that the birth rate hould be falling rapidly in the professional and middle classes and not in the "lower classes," Dr. Jeffries remarked: "The only way out of the difficulty is through the Monday, Nov. 27, 1933 teaching of birth control methods to all classes of the community. I think we should teach the poorer classes how to control their own reproduction."
