Those who object, or who may be offended by such lectures, may turn their radio dials and decline to hear.

We, therefore, demand that the Dominion Parliament take immediate action, removing from the Radio Commission the power to censor, hinder or prevent such lectures by radio and that the people be left free to determine what they may or may not hear. Men of world-wide repute and eminently qualified to explain the Bible, such as we believe Rutherford is, can be helpful to the people and we demand that our radio stations be permitted to publicly broadcast his lectures. The question is: Shall the people continue to enjoy freedom or shall a few men deprive them of their. God-given rights?
