PIONEER DROWNED

Albert Michaud of Terrace Loses His Life in Copper River, Provincial Police Are Advised

Headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised by Constable H. L. McKenney of Terrace of the drowning of Albert Michaud, well known Terrace prospector and trapper, at Eighteen Mile on the Copper River on November 10. Michaud and his partner, W. Elder, were engaged in rafting supplies across the swollen and turbulent stream when their paddle broke. Michaud was swept downstream and seen no more, Elder escaping to shore.

Michaud was one of the very early settlers of the Terrace district. All rivers and creeks in the Terrace district are very high.

The fire department had a call at 5 o'clock last evening to Glenie's florist shop in the Stori Block on Second Avenue where there was a chimney fire. No damage was done.
