British, German and French Ambassadors in Conference With President Roosevelt

ROME. March 17:-- There is con siderable excitement in Italy and especially in this city at the prospect of Premier Ramsay MacDonald and Sir John Simon's visit here for a conference with Premier Mussolini, because of the implied recognition that the Italian premier is now a world figure. Newspapers predict a new era of peace and operation of the nations.

Premier MacDonald when outlining his plan for restriction of armaments made a dramatic appeal to he representatives of the great powers and pictured what might ! happen if affairs were allowed to drift. His talk was very candid. He spoke of the danger of the action being taken by Chancellor Hitler of Germany, expressed the opinion that France should do her share and urged other nations to lend

WASHINGTON, March 17:-Yesterday the ambassadors of Great Britain, Germany and France each in turn called upon the President and was in consultation with him for some time at the White House.
