In the past we have had periods of apparent prosperity, but experience has proved these really to have been periods of prosperity only in some particular class at the expense of the other classes, a kind of prosperity which we have learned is foredoomed to be succeeded by an era of depression and confusion."

The writer of the article says that, to achieve such a condition as he suggests, the majority of the legislators must be "liberal" in their politics. He declares that in government there is a natural division between those who believe it is wise to hold fast to what we have and those who think that new elements, new problems, require new things in government. The supporters of Mr. Roosevelt believe that in the last United States election, the voters of the country definitely aligned themselves into the natural political divisions "Conservative" and "Liberal"-the normal grouping of human thought. In November there came to the Democratic ranks an enormous number of voters who believed that a liberal party, willing to try new things, was the only hope of economic salvation. He thinks this division of the people will be permanent.
