### NEWS FROM SMITHERS

Cut worms are devastating some of the Bulkley Valley gardens.

Moran & Polley of New Hazelton contemplate opening a pool room here in the near future.

Arthur Duncan, an Endako rancher, is on his way to North Dakota for a visit to his old home.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brewer came out from Ootsa Lake a few days ago, being the first settlers to bring a wagon through from Ootsa.

W. W. Wrathall, the Hazelton photographer, who recently visited Smithers, has some excellent views of the townsite and surroundings.

J. Linkin King, C. E., who has charge of Harold Price's surveying operations in this district, is expected to arrive here shortly to undertake surveys in this vicinity.

F. B. Chetleburgh will pay a visit to the Copper River coal fields to arrange for the continuance of development work, which will be in charge of J. K. Ashman.

It is understood that Lynch Bros. of Prince Rupert will establish a branch of their grocery and provision business in Smithers as soon as trains are running to this point.

Chief Constable Gammon is making a tour of inspection through the Bulkley Valley and in to the Decker and Burns Lake districts. He is accompanied by Constable Kelly, who will be stationed at South Bulkley.

F. M. Dockrill came up from Vancouver last week and will proceed to Morice River, where his company, the Prince Rupert Coal Fields, Ltd., is prospecting an extensive group of coal claims, on which there are deposits of good extent and quality.

The site for the government bridge which is to connect Smithers with the east side of the Bulkley has been chosen, and B. C. A. Affleck has surveyed a road to the station. He states that the difference in elevation between the river and the town is about 100 feet.

### SENTIMENT OF PROVINCE IS INSTINCTIVELY LIBERAL

sis of argument than the present rejuvenation of the Liberal party. However one may account for the obliteration of the party both in provincial and Federal parliaments, the fact is that the Liberals of today are bringing themselves into line for a political contest at the next election which will not permit of the characterization of "child's play."

"There is in any constituency in the province an absence of utter and contemptuous disappointment over the unstatesmanlike policy of the McBride administration. During the last three or four years the effects of the alienation of the Crown's resources in the province and the absolute neglect of anything like their permanent development together with the failure to encourage the settlement of land and of industry have become patent even to those electors gifted with only the most embryonic powers of discernment.

"As to public sentiment on the matter of the Borden naval policy, the wobbling attitudes of Sir Richard McBride, the conflicting and contrary positions taken by him during the last three years, have disclosed in him an 'opportunism' which five years ago the people of this province would have believed impossible in one occupying so prominent and naturally so influential a position.

"When Sir Richard said, and repeated, 'No naval policy can be satisfactory to the Province of British Columbia which does not provide for a fleet unit on the Pacific coast,' he struck a chord to which an immediate and tremulous response was given from every part of the province. When he began to vacillate the people lost their confidence not in the principle of the Pacific fleet unit but in the man who has apparently renounced that principle.

"The people of British Columbia as a whole are now getting their political bearings and perspective in a way they never had before. For years they were carried away, stampeded, by the premier's high sounding promises and his oft-repeated, unoriginal and stereotyped statement that his government had brought the province out of bankruptcy. The phrase is so timeworn that it has ceased to be historic and thoughtful men in his own party, as well as in the Liberal ranks, are beginning to 'sense' the events for which Sir Richard takes credit. They are beginning to understand what actually did take place and are beginning to ask the premier to tell them something new. It is extremely unlikely that the sophistry plausibility and guile of Sir Richard will avail him in the future as it has in the past."
