PROFESSOR IS HEARD

Women's Canadian Club Hears Enlightening Address by Winnipeg Man at Afternoon Meeting

A highly interesting and enlightening address on the subject of "Social Legislation and Public Service" was delivered before the Women's Canadian Club yesterday afternoon by Prof. W. G. Smith of Winnipeg, late of the faculty of the University of Toronto. Approaching world problems with a distinctly humanitarian viewpoint, Prof. Smith referred, among other questions, to the international debt situation. Had the vast sums which had been expended on the destruction of the Great War been spent for constructive purposes instead, now much further ahead civilization would have been, he conjectured. He referred to the forwardlooking policies of President Roosevelt as a result of which not only the United States but the entire world hoped for so much.
