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# UPPER CHAMBER HAS HECTIC SESSION KINGSFORD-SMITH TO EXTEND HIS FLIGHT AROUND WORLD

## British Sedition Bill Has Stormy Passage In House of Lords

Obstructionist Methods Employed by Labor Peers During Twelve Hour Sitting, Longest in Fifty Years' History Of Chamber—Some Amendments Not Considered

LONDON, Nov. 9: (CP)—The House of Lords adjourned at 4 o'clock this morning after a twelve hour session, the longest in fifty years' history of the Upper Chamber. Labor peers staged an obstructionist fight against the Incitement to Disaffection Bill sponsored by the government to curb sedition or treason in the armed forces. So dogged was the opposition that only thirteen out of twenty-four amendments were considered.

## CLEMENTS HAS FIRE

Three Big Buildings Owned by W. F. Hastie, Are Destroyed

PORT CLEMENTS, Nov. 9:—At 8:30 Tuesday night a fire broke out in Hastie's Hall here, the fire spreading and completely destroying two other residences. In one hour three large buildings were razed to the ground.

All the citizens of Port Clements turned out to try and save the buildings but, owing to wind that was blowing at the time, the fire got beyond control. All the buildings were owned by W. F. Hastie. There was no insurance on any of them. It is a very heavy loss to both Mr. and Mrs. Hastie who were among the first settlers to come to the Islands. Just now Mrs. Hastie is a guest of Mrs. Ed. Crawford of Port Clements.

## Australian Ace Plans Hops From Los Angeles to Gotham and London

Aviator Who Successfully Spanned Pacific Ocean This Week Expects to Hop Off on Globe-Girdling Trip Within Coming Month

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9: (CP)—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith, Australian flying ace who this week completed an eastward trans-Pacific flight, today announced plans for a flight from Los Angeles to London, a distance of seven thousand miles. He would first hop to New York, then to London and thence to Melbourne, thus completing a round the world flight. He expects to start within a month.

## USK MINE IS ACTIVE

One Hundred Tons of Valuable Concentrates Shipped From Columario Mill

Since the mill at the Columario mine on Gold Creek near Usk went into operation six weeks ago three carloads or about 100 tons of concentrates have been shipped to Trill smelter, it is stated by John Willman, manager of the mine, who is paying a brief visit to the city on business. Smelter returns have shown 5.4 ounces of gold and 15.08 ounces of silver to the ton of concentrates. The mill has run as much as 75 tons of ore per day.

Plans are to continue operation of the mine and mill, both of which are now employing some fifty men, throughout the winter. The concentrates are now being ferried across the Skeena River for shipment from Esk. When the ice comes on the river and ties the ferry up, the concentrates will be trucked to Terrace for shipment from there.

Mr. Willman is here to attend the annual meeting this afternoon of the Northern British Columbia Timbermen's Association which has been revived through the prospect of shipments of hemlock logs from this district for export being made. George Little and C. L. M. Giggey, well known Terrace sawmill operators, are here for the same meeting, being accompanied by their wives. All arrived from the interior on last night's train and will return home this evening.
