British Columbia Should Go Full Speed Ahead Now

MONEY WILL BE ADVANCED FROM TIME TO TIME BY OTTAWA AS RE-QUIRED - ULTIMATE AMOUNT OF LOAN NOT MADE KNOWN AS YET.

OTTAWA, May 19: (CP)—An understanding has been reached between Premier R. B. Bennett and Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia with respect to negotiations for a federal loan to the province, Premier Pattullo WHARF IS announced yesterday just prior to leaving for home. The federal government will advance money in the form of a loan from time to time to assist the province in meeting its obligations and carrying on recovery efforts with respect to work and wages. The ultimate amount of the loan was not made known.

Premier Pattullo seemed satisfied with the outcome of the negotiations and said there was no reason why British Columbia should not go ahead full speed toward recovery.
