BREAK OF SMALLPOX ON EMPRESS OF INDIA

Hundred Passengers on Ocean Steamer Must Stay
in Quarantine for Three Weeks Until Danger of
Infection is Past

(Canadian Press Despatch)
Victoria, July 24.—With the
"Jack" at her foremast
as a sign that she had a
serious disease on board, the
R. liner, Empress of India,
arrived Williams Head yesterday
noon, and landed one of the
passengers who is suffering from
smallpox.
A man had been suffering for
days from the disease which
developed during the voyage,
and was the only person on board
suffering from the disease, and
precaution had been taken

to prevent any contagion from
spreading.
There are sixty-five saloon and
406 steerage passengers on board
the Empress of India, and these
must all stay in quarantine for
the next eighteen days, for fear
lest any should be infected.

PRIVATE CLIFFORD OF TORONTO WINS KING'S PRIZE

VICTORIA DEFEATED

New Westminster Beat Them
by 4 to 3 in an Extended
Game.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
Westminster, July 24.—The lo-
cal lacrosse team defeated Victoria
by four to three on Saturday, in
an Amateur League game, after
playing for fifteen minutes over
time.

Bisley, England, July 24.—Private Clifford, of the Royal
Grenadiers, Toronto, won the King's Prize at Bisley on Sat-
urday afternoon. A few days ago he won the Prince of
Wales Prize also. He has been shooting consistently through-
out the meet, and has carried off a long list of honors for
Canada at the Bisley meeting.

Bisley, England, July 24.—By
the victory of Private Clifford of
Toronto in the King's Prize on
Saturday—the greatest shooting
event in the Empire—the Cana-
dian team capped a series of triumphs
this year. At every stage of
the great event a Canadian led.

Corporal J. Trainor of Royal
Canadian Rifles, Toronto, headed
the aggregate in the first stage
of the King's Prize, winning the
coveted bronze medal of the Na-
tional Rifle Association, while in
the third and final stage Private
Clifford led, winning the gold

medal and purse.

There were 1150 competitors
in the initial stages. Clifford's
victory was a popular one, and the
young marksman was carried in
triumph round the camp by his
admirers after the victory.

Fourteen Canadians qualified for
the second stage of the great
match, and seven for the final.

In addition to carrying off the
King's Prize, Clifford won the
Prince of Wales prize, and ranked
high among the prize winners for
the Daily Telegraph cup, the
Imperial Tobacco shield, Corpo-
ration of London contest and the

Graphic trophy and the Stock
Exchange match.

For the Rajah of Kolapore
Cup, the Canadians tied in total
score with the mother country,
but lost the cup as the mother
country had the bigger score at
the longer range.

Lance Corporal Trainor who
carried off the first stage off the
King's Prize did some remarkable
shooting. He made a possible
35 at the 600 yard range in the
King's Prize and got within one
of the maximum in the City of
London match at 800 yards.

Western Cities Taking Steps to

row's Intention Has Been Received by Several Intimate Friends

PARLIAMENT IS ANGRY AT LORD'S AMENDMENTS

House Would Not Listen to Premier Asquith When He
Mentioned the Subject—After Vain Attempts
to Secure Order, the Premier Had to
Give Up

(Canadian Press Despatch)

London, July 24.—A scene of
wild disorder marked the session
of the House of Commons today.
Half a dozen times the Premier
rose to move the consideration
of the Lords' amendment to the
Parliamentary bill, and each time
he was howled down by a terrific
din, so loud that the speaker
could not be heard.

The Speaker of the House ap-
pealed to both sides to preserve
Parliamentary decorum. Again
Mr. Asquith essayed to speak
but was unable to prevail against
the uproar and gave it up.

FIRE AT QUEBEC

Grist Mill Owned by Vancouver
Men is Burned Up

(Canadian Press Despatch)
Bryston, Que., July 24.—A grist
mill and residence close by were
burned yesterday afternoon from
some unknown cause. The loss
to Bryston is more than a financial
one, but the mill loss will be
about \$12,000. J. Work and
C. E. Sprout of Vancouver are the
owners.
