

Output of Primary Industries In British Columbia is Ahead By Twenty Million This Year

VICTORIA, Dec. 4: (CP)-Primary industries of British Columbia are expected to have a combined output of \$140,000,000 this year, according to provincial officials, or an increase of \$20,000,000 over last year. Of this total lumber products may reach \$45,000,000; minerals and metals, \$41,000,000; agricultural products, \$39,000,000, and fisheries, \$15,-000,000. To this must be added returns from factories, transportation, public utilities and other forms of services.

Current reports indicate that some percentage gain has been made in almost every class of industry.
