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#### RADIO COMMISSION

We do not agree with our local member in his wholesale opposition to the Canadian Radio Commission. It may possibly be too expensive in its official methods and there may be in connection with its conduct of affairs some things of which we are not aware here but, on the whole, there has been such a market improvement in the Canadian broadcasting since it has had charge that we feel it should be allowed to continue as a permanent organization subject to any corrective measures that may be required.

We have been informed that plans are on foot to improve the broadcasting in British Columbia. This should be done but it should be controlled as has been done during the past few years. It should be remembered that the cost of the commission is borne by the users of radio. They pay the bill and should be given service such as they have been getting but with improvements that will make it as valuable in this province as in others.

#### ARMAMENTS RACE

While individuals of the various nations today consider themselves civilized no one can claim that the governments have yet emerged from the status of the savage. Their ideals seem to be the same as those which influenced the men and women of the stone age. Most of the nations of the world are preparing for war, yet they all know that war is a horrible thing to contemplate—much more to experience.
