AN INIQUITOUS SYSTEM

Premier Pattullo is said to have referred to unemployment relief as an "iniquitous system." Most people will agree with him in that. It was intended to be only a temporary expedient but conditions proved worse than were expected and the relief army grew until it assumed immense proportions. Of course it was abused, and even where it was not, it had a bad effect on the recipients. Many people have been trying to find a way to prevent a recurrence of the conditions of the past few years. A new political party was formed with leaders chosen from socialist ranks, pledged to change the whole economic system and because of the apparent failure of the old system it received a large measure of support. All sorts of systems have been proposed but none have so far been accepted by the people.

What will probably be done will be to move along the old British way of building a new constitution step by step rather than by adopting the revolutionary Marxian system and plunging into something of the workings of which we know nothing. Russia set out on a political venture based on the "dictatorship of the proletariat" and after millions of lives had been sacrificed and untold hardships brought upon a huge section of the people they have arrived at a system of state capitalism which does not seem to have been contemplated in the beginning. We are not criticizing the Russians who were ruled under a pernicious system prior to the revolution, but all we wish to point out is that no one can tell how any of the theoretical systems will work out. All we know is the tried systems. We know of their abuses and they make us desirous of a change.

We feel sure the people of the province will be with Premier Pattullo in his desire to abolish the relief system and replace it by work and wages for all.

LEAD IS RETAINED

Eighth Inning Rally Wins For Railroaders Who Defeat Elks 7-6 In Softball

In last night's City League softball fixture the top-notch Canadian National Recreation Association nine consolidated their lead in the second half with a last minute win over the Elks.

The Lodgemen started off in grand style, gleaming four runs in the first inning and two in the second frame, mostly on C. N. errors. But this is all the runs they got, the remaining seven stanzas being blanks as far as Elks' scoring was concerned. In direct contrast to their opponents the Railroaders commenced the game by a successive parade of errors, misplays and overthrows in the field and were equally as bad at the stick, their score remaining nil until the fifth when they pushed across their first two tallies on singles by Wicks and Pitcher, coupled with several Elks infield faults. Two hits in the next inning gave them one more tally but the Elks, with a three run lead still, refused to take these seriously in view of the fact that the Hungerford lads were putting up such a "oose brand of ball."

But in the first of the eighth the Railroaders shook themselves out of their early innings daze and struck a two-bagger by Captain Geddes, an error at short and the rebellion started. Before the up-rising was quelled the three-run lead was overcome and the Railroaders were one tally to the good. They might have been even more to the good if poor base running on the part of the C. N. R. A. had not given the Elk infield opportunity to perform the first triple play of the season to down the side.

The Lodgemen made a strong attempt to overcome the one run lead but they were unsuccessful even though they filled the bags in their turn at bat with nobody out. Two grounders to short and a pop fly by Budnich dashed their hopes. The final score was 7 to 6.

Armour Leads Canadian Golf


Chicago Player Takes Firm Grip on First Place in Title Play at Toronto
