AN INIQUITOUS SYSTEM

Premier Pattulo is said to have referred to unemployment relief as an "iniquitous system." Most people will follows: agree with him in that. It was intended to be only a temporary expedient but conditions proved worse than were expected and the relief army grew until it assumed immense proportions. Of course it was abused, and even where it was not, it had a bad effect on the recipients.

Many people have been trying to find a way to prevent a recurrence of the conditions of the past few years. A new political party was formed with leaders chosen from socialist ranks, pledged to change the whole economic system and because of the apparent failure of the old system LEAGUE FOOTBALL STANDING it received a large measure of support. All sorts of systems have been proposed but none have so far been accep- Regiment

ted by the people.

What will probably be done will be to move along the old Legion British way of building a new constitution step by step rather than by adopting the revolutionary Marxian system and plunging into something of the workings of which we know nothing. Russia set out on a political venture based on the "dictatorship of the proletariat" and after millions of lives had been sacrificed and untold hardships brought upon a huge section of the people they have arrived at a system of state capitalism which does not seem to have been contemplated in the beginning. We are not criticizing the Russians who were ruled under a pernicious system prior to the revolution, but all we wish to point out is that no one can tell how any of the theoretical systems will work out. All we know is the tried systems. We know of their abuses and they make us desirous of a change.

We feel sure the people of the province will be with Premier Pattullo in his desire to abolish the relief system and replace it by work and wages for all.


