

QUEEN CHARLOTTE CITY, Aug. 7:-Miss Edna Beaven, Queen Charlotte City High School pupil and daughter of Harry Beaven, well known and popular local merchant, last week shot and killed in the back yard of her home in the centre of this community a huge black bear that had been raiding chicken houses there for some time including those of Mr. Beaven and Mrs. H.
