LONDON, Nov. 6: (CP)-Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of the British Fascists, today won a libel suit against the Evening Star which he claimed had presented his political program in a false and violent light. The jury returned a verdict of \$25,000 damages and ordered the defendant to pay the costs of the trial.

Stevens Declares Big Interests Trying To Get Something On Him


Praises Newspapers in Toronto Address For Their Courage and Warns Government Against Policy of Drifting-Has no Ambitions
