# TWELVE LOST IN SHIP FOUNDERING

## AUTHORITIES READY FOR CUSTOMS DUTY EVASION CASES

### Graphic Account of Disaster Involving Atlantic Freighter

F. A. Lindsay of Victoria is Only British Columbian Named in Blanket Warrant of Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Montreal

MONTREAL, Dec. 15: (CP)—With one hundred witnesses instructed to be ready, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police today had their case in order to proceed in court in the \$5,000,000 alleged liquor duties evasion charges in which sixty-one defendants have been named in a blanket warrant. The police were still, however, without their prisoners. They gave those named in the warrant another day to come to Montreal voluntarily or be picked up. F. A. Lindsay of Victoria was the only British Columbian named.

### WASTAGE OF FISH

Alaska Salmon Canners Prosecuted in Frisco For Violating Little Known Statute

SEATTLE, Dec. 15: (CP)—The Alaska Packers' Association and C. A. Halverson of San Francisco were charged in federal court yesterday with violation of a little known statute prohibiting wastage of salmon.

Assistant United States Attorney Gerald Shucklin filed an information saying that the defendants "unlawfully and wantonly wasted or destroyed salmon" by not using the tail cuts in their cannery at Chignik, Alaska.

### THREE MEN ARRESTED

Joe Celona of Vancouver Alleged to Have Lived Off the Avails Of Prostitution

VANCOUVER, Dec. 15: (CP)—Joe Celona, whose name was mentioned during the election campaign and who figured in the 1928 police investigation, was arrested yesterday and charged with living off the avails of prostitution. He was released on \$30,000 bail after the bond had been increased twice from \$10,000.

Lou Barrack, arrested on the same charge, was granted bail in the sum of \$5000. Both men will appear in answer to charges on December 21.

The warrants were sworn out by a woman whose name police have not divulged.

#### White Slavery Charged

Clarence Bancroft was committed for trial by Magistrate W. M. McKay in police court yesterday on a white slavery charge and is being held in custody. Defence counsel said his client would not seek release on bail. The magistrate had suggested bail of \$30,000.

### FINLAND ONLY NATION TO PAY WAR DEBT TO UNITED STATES TODAY

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 15.—European war debts to the United States fell due to day, instalments totalling \$115,000,000. Only \$228,500, however, was paid, this being from Finland. All other debtor nations advised the State Department that they would not be paying.

### Little Change In Stock Prices Is Recorded Friday

NEW YORK, Dec. 15:—Stock prices moved irregularly within a narrow range in yesterday's trading on the New York Stock Exchange, some issues moving up slightly and others down slightly. The market was very dull with 220,000 shares changing hands. Closing averages were: industrials, 100.69, off .01; rails, 36.35, off .06; utilities, 17.94, off .02; bonds, 95.27, up .03.

Large Attendance at Funeral Last Saturday of Well Known Young Port Simpson Man

PORT SIMPSON, Dec. 15:—There was a large attendance at the funeral here last Saturday of Edward James Knott, one of Port Simpson's best known young men, who died last week at the age of twenty-five years. Rev. R. J. Love, pastor of the local United Church, officiated and interment was made in Port Simpson Cemetery.

Deceased had been ill for five years and on the last occasion had been a patient in the Port Simpson General Hospital for five weeks, having however, been there for some time previously. Born in Port Simpson, he was the youngest member of the family of the late Joseph T. Knott and Mrs. Esther Knott (now Mrs. Wesley). Besides his mother, he is survived by two sisters—Mrs. Florence Esther Wilson of Prince Rupert and Mrs. Harry H. Ryan of Port Simpson—and one brother, Roger Thomas Knott of Port Simpson. Deceased was a member of the Y. P. E. A. and also of the Port Simpson Concert Band.

### American Banker Has Passed Away

Anthony Drexel of Philadelphia Dies in New York at Age of 74

NEW YORK, Dec. 15:—Anthony Drexel, prominent Philadelphia banker, died here yesterday at the Ambassador Hotel following a month's illness. Since his return from a trip to Europe he had been confined to bed at the hotel.

### Sixty-One Defendants Given Day to Give Up Selves or Be Arrested

Cunarder Ascania Has Eighteen Survivors on Board and Captain Suggests Seventeen Lost—Chief Officer of Belgian Rescue Ship One of Victims

NEW YORK, Dec. 15: (CP)—A graphic account of the foundering of the British freighter Usworth, 400 miles east of Newfoundland, in which was pictured exhausted seamen of the Usworth tossed into wild seas and choking in oil released from rescue ships to calm the water, was received in a wireless message today from the Belgian

rescue steamer Jean Jadot. The dead as a result of the disaster are now placed at twelve, ten of whom were members of the Usworth's crew who could not be rescued as well as the chief officer and one seaman of the Jadot lost when a lifeboat capsized.

The Cunarder Ascania is reported to have eighteen survivors aboard but the captain places the lost at seventeen.

### Trades and Labor Council Presents Radio to Hospital

The hospital board, at its regular monthly meeting last night, accepted with thanks an offer from the Prince Rupert Trades & Labor Council to equip the medical ward of the institution with a short wave radio which, the council feels, will be a great boon to the patients. It is the intention of the council to make a substantial donation itself and to solicit friends for the balance of the cost of the receiver. All the hospital board was asked for was permission to install the machine. The offer was conveyed to the board by S. D. Macdonald, president of the Trades & Labor Council and a member of the board.
