PENSGROVE, New Jersey, February 3 (Canadian Press) - A band of robbers held up two messengers in front of a bank here yesterday and escaped with a satchel containing \$130,000 intended for payrolls.

MINISTER ARRAIGNED

Rev. A. E. Smith, C.L.D.L. Secretary. Released on \$10,000 Bail Pending Trial On Sedition Charge

TORONTO, February 3 (Canadian Press) Rev. A. E. Smith. former minister of the gospel and new secretary of the Canadian Labor Defence League, was released; on \$10,000 bail yesterday when he appeared on a charge of sedition. the trial being set for February 19. Smith was placed under arrest couple of days ago following search for him by police. He said to have disappeared after having been advised that proceedings were to be taken against him. Later, however, he was located.

The sedition charge against Smith arises out of a statement alleged to have been made by him to the effect that Premier Bennet ordered the murder" of Tim Buck who is serving a five-year term a Kingston Penitentiary on an unlawful assembly charge.
