KILLED IN LOG CAMP

Thomas Sapella Loses His Life At Cumshewa Inlet

Bringing in the body of Thomas Sapella, Vancouver logger, who was fatally injured in an accident in the A. P. Allison Logging Co.'s camp at Cumshewa Inlet, the power tug Salvage Princess arrived here this morning from the Queen Charlotte
