Detroit Negro, Joe Lewis, Going Strong—Knocks Out Lee Ramage

CHICAGO, Dec. 17.—Joe Lewis, Detroit negro, jumped into the forefront of the new crop of possible challengers for Max Baer's world heavyweight boxing crown on Friday night when he knocked out Lee Ramage in the eighth round of a scheduled ten round fight. Lewis had knocked Ramage down four times before the latter finally took the count. The negro has won his last twelve fights, ten of them by the knock-out route.

District News PRINCE GEORGE

Considerable interest continues to be taken locally in the proposal for the establishment of a meat packing plant to serve the central interior. Preliminary negotiations with a view to the consummation of some such sort of a project along co-operative lines are being carried out.

The quality of alsike seed exhibited at this year's fairs and seed shows throughout the central interior has demonstrated conclusively that soil and climatic conditions of the Prince George and McBride districts are particularly suitable to the growing of this seed.

W. Collins of Vanderhoof has acquired a farm at Tabor Creek and will be moving on to it soon with sixteen cows.

Cream and butter prices remain steady in the interior. For butter the stores are paying 25c. per pound in trade and for eggs 49c. per dozen in trade. It is expected there will be an up-turn in meat prices early in the year.

According to reports received here, a large and exceptionally fine crop of timothy seed was harvested this year in the Bulkley Valley and Lakes district. It is estimated that there will be in the neighborhood of three hundred tons all told.

STEWART

Some three and a half tons of ore shipped from the Black Hill property this fall gave a smelter return of 94 ounces gold, 243.92 ounces silver and 88 percent copper.

Considerable difficulty having been experienced in supplying some eight or ten prospectors, ranging in ages from 65 to 80 years, who have been living in widely scattered cabins, with food, clothing and medical attention. Government Agent W. H. Dodd is now endeavoring to centralize them in the Miners' Rest on Fifth Street where there is ample accommodation. They are about the only men in Stewart who are receiving relief.

C. G. Jackson, with a crew of some five men, is making excellent progress with the construction of the long crib on the bank of the Bear River opposite the east end of Second Street. When completed, the crib will guard that part of the ownsite from being menaced by high water when the river is in flood. The work is being carried out by the federal department of public works.

John Hepson, who has been in town from the El Oro property, reports that he and Charles Biehl are making good progress with the driving of a drift on the big zone which they located during the past summer. The vein has a width of twenty feet with some three feet of ore carrying from \$30 to \$40 in old and silver. It is proposed to drive forty feet and then crosscut both ways to the walls of the zone.
