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B.C. PREMIER LEAVES OTTAWA

Queen Charlotte Islands Are Showing Healthy Industrial Revival

Prime Minister Has Deferred Signing of Relief Arrangement

Insists That Ottawa Give Answer First on Building Program—Hopeful in Connection With Better Treatment Case and P. G. E.

OTTAWA, Aug. 3: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo left last night on his return to Victoria, adhering to his decision not to sign the direct relief agreement with the Dominion government until a reply is given to his suggestion for a nation-wide building program.

When Food Supplies Were Cut Off in San Francisco



With thousands of workers out on strike, in sympathy with the onshoremen and dockmen who had been on strike for two months, San Francisco was in a turmoil. Martial law was declared. The effects were being felt as far north as Vancouver, where longshoremen refused to unload vessels they claimed were unfairly loaded. The layout shows Governor Frank F. Merriam, who had held that post for only a month and who faced the gravest problem any governor in the U. S. had had to face in years. Other photos show scenes from recent disorders in which at least three were killed, and state troopers marching in to gain advantage points.

TRIBUTE TO HINDENBURG

Great National Funeral Will Be Given Soldier-Statesman Next Tuesday

BERLIN, August 3 (Canadian Press)—A great national funeral will be held next Tuesday for the President Paul von Hindenburg at Tannenberg Memorial where the body will lie in state prior to the obsequies. Chancellor Adolph Hitler, the one time Austrian house painter who assumed the presidency one hour and ten minutes after Field Marshal Hindenburg's death yesterday, will give the funeral oration. The former Crown Prince Wilhelm will attend in person and take a prominent part in the mourning around the national monument. The family of the famous soldier-statesman has requested that no flowers be sent to the funeral but that the money which would have been used to purchase them be devoted to helping the poor.

BUILDING HOLDS UP

Value So Far This Year Well Ahead Of Last—Fortieth City in Canada

While building permits issued in this city during the month of July were light at \$525, a very creditable building showing has been made so far this year in Prince Rupert. The total value having been \$56,755 as compared with \$13,265 in the first seven months of 1933. Prince Rupert is placed as the fortieth city in Canada in volume of building so far this year, having exceeded a number of other cities of greater size.

CANNERY WALK-OUT

Employees of Sunny Point Plant at Ketchikan Strike For Fifty Cents Per Hour

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 3: (CP)—When their demands for a wage of 50c per hour were refused, 165 employees of the Sunny Point plant of the Alaska Pacific Salmon Co. went on strike yesterday. Officials refused to consider the demands and said that, if necessary, they would import labor. With thirty thousand fish on hand, boats were ordered to cease the brailing of fish traps. Almost normal operations were resumed today, sufficient men returning to work to enable the plant to continue.

PRESIDENT ON COAST

Roosevelt Arrives At Portland Today On His Return Home After Pacific Cruise

S. Houston. The chief executive will visit Spokane tomorrow and, on his way East, will make an inspection of the Boulder Dam, also visiting Minneapolis, St. Paul and Green Bay, Wisconsin.

VANCOUVER SHOOTING

Dr. A. P. Procter is Victim of Bullet Allegedly Fired by Engineer

VANCOUVER, Aug. 3:—Dr. A. P. Procter, C. P. R. physician and prominently identified with the Shaughnessy Military Hospital here, was shot in the stomach in his office in the C. P. R. station here this afternoon at 2:15 allegedly by T. A. Sargood, C. P. R. locomotive engineer from Revelstoke, who then turned the gun on himself.

Both Dr. Procter and Sargood are in serious condition, the latter being shot in the throat. W. W. Bowes, accountant for the Swift-Canadian Co. here, sailed last night on the Cardena for a trip to Vancouver.
