TRIBUTE TO HINDENBURG

Great National Funeral Will Be Given Soldier-Statesman Next Tuesday

BERLIN, August 3 (Canadian Press)-A great national funeral will be held next Tuesday for the President Paul von Hindenburg at Tannenburg Memorial where the body will lie in state prior to the obsequies. Chancellor Adolph Hitler, the one time Austrian house painter who assumed the presidency one hour and ten minutes after Field Marshal Hindenburg's death yesterday, will give the funeral oration. The former Crown Prince Wilhelm will attend in person and take a prominent part mourning around the national monument. The family of the famous soldier-statesman has requested that no flowers be sent to the funeral but that the money which would have been used to purchase them be devoted to helping the poor.
