

# Purchases Girls For Re-Marriage

Missionary From Island In South Seas Finds Wives For Tribe's Young Men

(CP) Back to civilization for the first time in 23 years. Rev. Pather Australia, told of a strange custom which necessitated his purchasing 124 native girls at \$10 each.

Girls were married on the day of their birth, almost invariably to old men, who were permitted as many wives as they desired. rigid standard of conduct within the tribe was insited amon, and under the severest penalties a husband was not allowed to trade one of his wives to another member of the eribe.

Sometimes, Father Gsell said. young native would take away a woman who was already married to one of the tribe, and immediately trouble would arise the whole tribe seeking to avenge such a breach of custom.

Often the runaway comple would amear at the mission, and then a bargaining process would begin The old husband generally would agree to the woman "marving" the missionary caring nothing what happened to her afterward. Actually what happened was that the missionary would agree to buy the girl, and would later hand her over to the care of the young man after he had given a pleage, in the presence of the tribe, that she would be his only wife.
